If you don't see what you want in Central Oregon ask for it. And if others cannot tell you about it stir things a bit yourself and you will be surprised at the result.

Senator Mitchell's plea in abatement was overruled by Judge Bellingier. Of course the same ruling will apply to all others who entered that plea. Now the indicted statesmen will have a chance to go to trial on their merits—unless they can dig up further technicalities.

Now comes an intimation that the D. I. & P. Co. will soon put on the reclamation work near Bend a larger construction force than it has yet had. There is no official confirmation of this, but it is known that land sales recently have greatly surpassed expectations and it is pointed out that there must be swift progress with the canals and ditches in order to water the land as fast as people want it. Land sales produce large revenue and will carry the construction work forward on a very extensive scale.

There never was a time when so much improvement work was in progress in Bend as now, notwithstanding a kind of dullness produced by reducing ditch construction crews. There has been more construction of buildings at one time, but now in addition to that activity there is work in other branches,—water works, telephones, sidewalks, street clearing, improvement of private premises, etc. We are balancing up our development, which grew to be somewhat lop-sided during the winter.

The scrip law of March 4, 1905, has had the effect of booming a few favored scrips—the Santa Fe, Washburn and one or two others the base of which had been relinquished under agreement with the secretary of the interior. The law does not specifically say that other scrips, based on perfected entries, shall not be competent to take lieu land, but there is some ambiguity about it and the only scrips that seem to be entirely above suspicion are those first mentioned above. Others may go, or they may encounter trouble. Guaranteed forest reserve scrip now brings \$7 an acre, soldier's additional \$6.25, and scrip that will take non-timbered land is worth \$6. So the new law was not such a bad thing for the big scrip seller.

Now Klamath Falls is the date line under which sheep killing yarns are spun. Some sheep were killed down that way and the event is made the pretext for the rehearsal of two or three other outrages of that character that have agitated the sheep country in the past year. They're bad enough at best, and there ought to be an end to such lawlessness; but it is not too much to say that there has been more lawlessness right in the city of Portland in the same time than on all the vast Eastern Oregon range—more destruction of property, more unjustifiable violence. This, of course, excuse the

sheep shooters. But neither does it stamp the range counties as preponderatingly criminal communities.

That is an important development project which Bend people are organizing in the vicinity of Prineville. It differs from most of the reclamation enterprises in that but a small part of the ground to be covered is still government domain. It is not, strictly speaking, desert land. But the productive power of this land will be vastly increased by the introduction of water and the private interests affected can well afford to put the project through. If the wagon road company, which will be so greatly benefited, will encourage the improvement, it is practically certain of success. The soil of those lands is deep and rich, a reliable market is at hand and the growth of this country—Central Oregon—is as certain as anything in human affairs can be. There is no safer field for investment, no better place for a home.

**PROGRESS NOTES.**

**Building and Improvement Work at Bend and in Vicinity of Bend.**

This week Jack Sheridan had five acres of ground plowed at his homestead in 18-13.

The removal of many trees and stumps from streets and alleys in the central part of town greatly improves the appearance of things.

Among this week's accessions to the Deschutes lands are W. A. Miller and Mert Sheets, of Atlantic, Iowa, who have taken seven forty of irrigated land north of town.

M. J. Morrison has just completed a neat four-room, full frame cottage on the river front at the southerly end of Garden Row near the bridge and the family is settled in the new dwelling.

E. A. Sather has begun the construction of a 16x40 foot one-story addition on the north side of his general store on Wall street. The new room will be used for a line of hardware, sash and doors and oils and paints.

The Bend band hall, 18x24, at the Corner of Tenth street and Greenwood avenue, has been finished and is now occupied by the band. Temporarily, the band has held its practice meetings over Mutzig's store.

Mrs. Eva A. Steele this week began construction of a two-story frame structure on Wall street between the Merrill drugstore and The Bulletin office. It is 14x24 on the ground. For a time it will be used chiefly as a dwelling and rooming house.

L. H. McCann has this week finished plowing and seeding about six acres at his homestead in 19-12. He has sowed the ground to alfalfa and field peas. He has radishes and new onions that will be ready for market in a short time. These are raised on unirrigated land.

**Through 16 Miles of Snow.**

George Finley and wife, of Crawfordville, and a party of 11 other persons, 10 men and three women in all, crossed the Cascade range over the Santiam route from Linn county, reaching Bend yesterday after six days' travel. They came through snow for 16 miles on the summit, some of it four feet deep. They had four teams with hacks and found it necessary to remove the wheels from the vehicles and mount the beds on runners. The snow was so deep that the men had to break the trail for the teams for many miles. These people are on their way to the vicinity of Christmas Lake, where they have taken desert claims.
