**TO BUILD A NEW HOTEL.**

**O'Kane Will Put up Large Structure at Once.**

Hugh O'Kane has changed his plans for rebuilding. Instead of putting up a saloon immediately that would be built into a hotel later, he concluded to build at once a complete hotel with a frontage of 67 feet on Oregon street and 75 feet on Bond. It will be two full stories in height, and will have 27 guest rooms, besides the other apartments of a well equipped hotel.

The hotel office will be at the corner of Oregon and Bond, where the burned saloon was. Next on Bond street will be the hall, then a commodious dining room, at the rear of which will be a one story kitchen. Then will come the parlor and there will be five guest chambers at the south end on the ground floor. On the Oregon street side the saloon will be next the office, and next to that will be a well equipped barber shop.

On the second floor there will be 22 guest rooms besides linen and bath room. The smallest will be 9x14 feet. There will be a hall from the head of the stairs parallel with Oregon street and another parallel with Bond street, with rooms opening off both sides.

Work on construction of this building was begun yesterday morning. It is expected to be ready to occupy about July 1.

Mr. O'Kane will go to Portland next week to buy furniture and fixtures for the new hotel, which he will probably call the Bend Hotel.
