When Indians come to smash the ball
And hike around the bases
And paint the town a ruddy hue
And likewise paint their faces,
They'll bring some speedy horses too
And chickadees to show it—
Oh, if you don't attend our Fourth
You'll sneer, surely rue it.

Bend must be about to have a railroad; a whole week has passed without a new crop of rumors.

Now the Maury Mountain reserve has been erected by proclamation of the president. This embraces 51,360 acres in Crook county 40 miles southeast of Bend.

Dr. Harry Lane, who was chosen Mayor of Portland last Monday over George H. Williams, first came into prominence as superintendent of the state insane asylum in the first term of Governor Pennoyer. Pennoyer removed him from the position and drew from Lane one of the most scorching denunciations that ever appeared in Oregon politics. Williams went down because of his leanings toward the Mitchell machine, which has become too much overloaded to navigate.

Three Russian cruisers from the battle of Japan sea limped into Manila and asked for permission to repair and take coal and provisions. Governor Wright and Admiral Train were inclined to grant this favor but when Washington heard of it orders were immediately given that the Russians could not use Manila to repair injuries received in battle and they must leave in 24 hours or disarm. Since Japanese warships were watching outside it was useless for the Russians to get away so they interned.

People are learning to farm in the Deschutes valley. They are learning that it avails nothing to put in seed early—that early planting becomes the worm which is devoured rather than the bird which devours it. In this climate the seeds germinate very quickly and the plants grow with amazing rapidity when the conditions are right. Crops from May or June planting will be more satisfactory than from March or April planting—indeed, this difference in seed time will frequently make all the difference between failure and success.

It will be fortunate if Bend learns its lesson without a general conflagration. The two fires we have had were clearly due to faulty flues. One was built of brick before cold set in last year, the other was built of stone in midwinter cold. This circumstance points to the fact that no chimney is above suspicion until it has proved its safety—not merely negatively by failing to burn the building, but under positive test to ascertain certainly that there are no leaks. Several chimneys have already been inspected and at least two found defective. This discovery has probably prevented two destructive fires. All other flues in town should be thoroughly examined and they should all be put in a condition above suspicion. There should also be a clearing of boxes

and inflammable refuse from alleys, back-yards and vacant premises. Unless there is care in these matters the insurance companies may refuse to do business here.

The Pilot Butte company has bought a feed mill which it will operate in connection with the saw-mill.

It has been decided to build a bridge across the Deschutes at Cline Falls and 60,000 feet of lumber has been ordered for the purpose.

At the D. I. & P. club houses extensive improvements are under way. The rocks have been removed from the river front and the spacious lawn leveled and sown to grass. A septic tank has been installed to take care of the drainage. Now arrangements for irrigating the premises are under way.

FROM FATHER HICKEY
Urges Catholics of Bend to be up and doing.

Shaniko, Or., June 6, (Editor Bend Bulletin)—Please notice in your issue of this week, that devine services will be held in Bend on Sunday, June 18, at such hour and place, as the local Catholics may deem best. This will be the last opportunity offered the Catholics to comply with their Easter duty. Confessions will be heard before mass, and after mass, Sunday school will be taught. I shall expect the Catholics of Bend, and especially those who constitute the committee appointed six months ago, to make a report of the matters entrusted to them and informally discussed at that time. I beg to state here also very clearly that if the Catholics of Bend and surrounding country desire the ministrations of a priest, and are anxious for the erection of a Catholic church, they must show their earnestness by an activity worthy of the cause. I would respectfully suggest to them, therefore, to make a thorough canvass previous to my next visit, to hold a meeting and determine on a line of action. I am disposed to do all I can—to spare no pains for the good of religion and humanity, but the Catholics of Bend, must themselves be the prime movers. They cannot expect from others an assumption of burdens for their sake, which they are unwilling to assume. I anticipate the best and happiest results from their united action and so await with impatience the good tidings that I know will mark my visit to Bend.
