The horse was three years old the 25th of last March and weighs 1,920 pounds. This is one of the finest horses ever brought to Oregon.

W. E. Guerin, jr., arrived from his New York trip last Friday evening. His irrigation enterprise in the Ochoco valley was conditionally finished, the report of an expert engineer being required before the transaction is completed. Mrs. Guerin and her aunt, Mrs. Bancroft, are expected in Bend next week and they will remain here through the summer.

The traction engine used by Steidl & Reed for hauling logs and lumber has got its second wind and is doing great work these days. At first there was trouble with old worn gears. But that was cured by new and suitable gear and Mr. Steidl says the cost of hauling logs from near the head of the Pilot Butte flume has been reduced from \$4 to 80 cents a thousand. Each day the old engine hauls 10,000 to 12,000 feet of lumber from the mill up to flume and returns with 6,000 to 8,000 feet of sawlogs. It takes all day to make the round trip of 10 miles.

E. R. Lester, who was last week dismissed from the position of regular policeman here, left Monday morning saying that he had secured a job as brakeman on the O. R. & N. He left some unpaid debts and his creditors have begun proceedings to collect some of them. A. H. Lippman & Co. Tuesday levied on his household furniture for the purchase price thereof, \$192. Lester did not leave his affairs in very good circumstances. His mother, wife and child have the family home here, which is mortgaged. Lester did not resign the city marshalship, but he evidently abandoned it.
