The Williamson-Gesner-Bigg jury disagreed, with a majority said to be for conviction, and the defendants will get another trial.

A new rule has been made by the state land board respecting school district bonds, requiring the voters to say under which section of the statute the bonds shall be disposed of as well as whether there shall be bonds at all. So it is deemed best to have another bond election in Bend and this time submit the question for \$5,000.

We should think Washington would be sick of grafting and grafters, as the despatches say. The whole wretched business is sickening to anyone whose conception of civic honor is not of the lowest. We need more men built on the plan of Louis Agassiz, who declared "I cannot afford to waste my time making money." They who live for money lose it quite as often as they make it, and if they have no nobler ambition they are poor indeed, though they roll in gold.

Do you know a town where the citizens are consumed with petty jealousies and won't trust each other or pull together for the town? If so, you know a weak community, no matter what its resources and advantages may be. Do you know a town where the people stand together as a unit, have faith in themselves and their neighbors and pull all the time for the welfare of the community and take pride in it? If so, you know a town that is strong and will succeed, no matter what its resources and advantages may be. Booms do not abide, prosperity may not always be equal, but when a community stands together it can accomplish surprising results. When all interests stand together a town is like a cube, square—no matter on which side it rests it is right side up.

Why do the court reporters continually write about United States land commissioners? There is only one such functionary and he is at the head of the general land office at Washington. These others are United States commissioners and belong to the judicial department of the government and not to the land department at all. It so happens that in localities where there is much public land activity the chief work of United States commissioners is in connection with land applications, contests and proofs. But in the national judicial system they occupy a position similar to that of justice of the peace in the state judiciary, and their jurisdiction is no more limited to public land matters than is the jurisdiction of a justice of the peace limited to taking acknowledgements of deeds.
