water from the Tumalo about a mile above the county road crossing. The corporation has an authorized capital of \$5,000 and its headquarters will be Bend.

Dr. Nichol has a field of oats that he will match against the world. The grain now stands so tall that it hides him from view and it is still growing; and the doctor is a 6-footer. A large number of the berry vines and bushes he set out last fall are now bearing, though of course this is not a paying crop. It was not expected they would produce at all this season. Everything on the Nichol farm is doing well.

Miss Mary Riley has a field of rye that she is quite proud of and she went out under the shadow of a pine tree, where there had been no fire—just the place that is popularly supposed to be worthless for agriculture—and got rye 6 1/2 feet long and brought to The Bulletin the other day. She took a photograph of the grain and for the purpose of comparison had her mother go out into the field a little way. But Mrs. Riley was wholly hidden by the grain until she stretched up her hands, and she is no midget either.

Quite a number of Louisiana tanagers have been gracing the Deschutes country with their presence this season—probably in honor of the Lewis and Clark fair. These are 'showy' birds, a trifle smaller than the blackbird or rusty grackle, head and neck red, wings and tail black, rump and lower part bright yellow. Their song is somewhat like that of the robin. Several of these birds have been found dead in Bend, but it cannot be believed that any person, young or old, could be so wantonly cruel as to slay them and the cause of their death is a mystery.

The Library Association.

At the annual meeting of the Bend Library Association held last Tuesday night all the trustees were re-elected—J. B. Overturf, Mrs. E. F. Batten, Mrs. J. F. Circle, P. L. Tompkins and J. M. Lawrence. The trustees will meet next Tuesday night to choose their officers and decide on matters pertaining to the coming year's work.
