TO GET INTO COURT
Matter of Collection of Smith & Cleek Fee.
COUNTY LICENSE IN THE CITY
Weymouth Elected Marshal -- Hose House to be Built for the Fire Department.

At the regular meeting of the common council Tuesday evening Mayor Goodwillie was instructed to engage counsel and proceed to collect of Smith & Cleek the license fee for running a saloon in the city. This firm last November took a county license for one year, paying \$400 therefor. In January Bend set up a municipal government and fixed the saloon license fee at \$600 per year. All the other saloons met the city's demands, but Smith & Cleek stand on their county license and say the city cannot disturb them during its life. This is the issue that is to be settled by the courts.

C. M. Weymouth was formally elected city marshal to fill the unexpired term of E. R. Lester, removed from office. Mr. Weymouth was paid \$155.07 for salary as policeman from June 19 to September 1.

Bills aggregating \$52.28 for preparing the new cemetery were presented. \$38.20 of which were referred to the finance committee. The remainder was ordered paid.

Ralph Sheldon and a committee from the fire department was present and asked the official recognition of the council and help in defraying the expense of organization. The council voted \$12.50 to each of the two companies and agreed to pay the cost of printing bylaws of the department. The fire committee was instructed to recommend a site and plan for the construction of a hose house that shall shelter both carts. This report is to be presented at another meeting of the council to be held at the recorder's office next Tuesday evening.

ACTIVITY AT TUMALO.
Good Crops on New Land--To Merd Route to Bend.
TUMALO, Or., Sep. 5.—W. J. Hightower returned from Shaniko yesterday bringing more goods for the Hightowers & Smith store at this place.
John B. and Adam Wimer have gone to Baksoven, after a bunch cows and calves that the Wimers bought at that place.
Mrs. Wimer is at Tumalo hauling lumber from the Hightower & Smith mill up to the head of the Wimer-Jensen ditches. They are going to put in quite a lot of fluming at the head of the ditch this fall.
Mr. Spauld and family are expected home from Douglas county soon.
Mr. Gerkins, near Tumalo, has just completed cutting and putting up about 30 tons of fine grain hay—the first crop. Wimer & White will soon have their new steel hay baler here and at work. They sent to Atlanta, Ga., for it. They have quite a lot of hay to bale for themselves and for others.
J. E. Gardiner was at Tumalo last week making arrangements with Wimer & White to bale a large lot of hay for him on his ranch east of Clute Falls.
W. R. Mudd, the superintendent of the Columbia Southern Irrigation Co. at Tumalo yesterday. He reports everything running along nicely in the valley east of this place.
Thomas Arnold, of Sisters, was at Tumalo last week. He reports grand crops in the Squaw creek country. He raised fine corn this summer.
A. J. Wimer, deputy road supervisor of this road district, has sent in a petition asking the county court to make an appropriation sufficient to charge the grade and materially improve the hills between Tumalo and Bend. This is a good move, for the road needs much work in order to accommodate the increased travel over it.
The Columbia Southern Irrigation Co. has built a good bridge across the large canal on the road between this place and Bend, which makes it more convenient for travel.
Hightower & Smith are sawing much lumber and are crowded with orders.
The people are expecting a threshing machine in these parts soon. There will be quite a lot of grain to thresh this fall.

GIRL BADLY BURNED
Saved Baby Which was in Her Charge.
TROUBLE WITH ALCOHOL LAMP
James Covered the Two and Prompt Drenching Prevented a Fatal Burning.

Grace Kever, who works as nurse girl for Mrs. Rowlee, lit an alcohol lamp yesterday afternoon while holding the baby on the other arm. The lamp flamed up and ignited the uncorked bottle of alcohol which the girl held in her hand. The bottle burst and the flames spread over the baby. The girl at once drenched the child, while her own clothing caught fire. Then she ran out of the room and put the child in Mrs. Rowlee's arms, and herself started for the river. A tub of water stood on the porch and the girl pulled that over herself, quenching the flames and saving her own life.

The girl suffered severe burns about her left arm, shoulder, back and side, there were some blisters on her neck and her hair is singed. The burns are not deep but are painful and quite serious. Her own quick action and the prompt response of Dr. Coe reduced the results of the accident to the minimum. Grace Kever is but 15 years old. Her protection of the child in her charge set herself afire but she gave no heed to herself until the safety of the child was assured. The baby was uninjured, though its clothing was considerably scorched.

Girls Go a-Roughing It.
Miss Reid and Miss Jones, the Bend schoolma'ams, returned Monday from a ten days jaunt across the Cascade range. They were attired in cowboy costume, wore six-shooters and belts of cartridges, had their rolls of blankets strapped on behind their saddles and looked as businesslike as veteran cavalrymen. They journeyed 100 miles—to a point six miles beyond Cascadia and within 20 miles of Lebanon—and back, sleeping and eating where they could and viewing the sights of the country. They saw one fierce black bear—but it had been slain by hunters 10 minutes before. They will write a book reciting the thrilling adventures of this 200-mile journey in the mountains fastnesses of Oregon.
