WILLIAMSON ET AL CONVICTED.

Congressman Williamson, and his business partner Dr. Van Gesner, and U. S. Commissioner Biggs, all of Prineville, were this week found guilty of the crime of subornation of perjury.

On February 11 the grand jury reported an indictment against these defendants, charging them with having induced 45 persons to apply in June 1902 for land in Tp. 15 S. R. 19 E. about 25 miles east of Prineville.

The penalty for this offense is a fine of not more than \$2000 and imprisonment at hard labor not more than five years.

Comment at this time is useless. It was greatly to be desired that these men should prove their innocence.
