Another railroad was incorporated this week to build across Eastern Oregon from Huntington—the Pacific & Oregon, with capital of \$7,500,000. The incorporation fee and annual license for this concern are \$300.

### Jim Benham Burned Out.

The house on James R. Benham's homestead, seven miles north of Bend, burned Monday afternoon with all its contents. The loss is about \$900, no insurance. Mr. Benham was engaged in cutting wood but a short distance from the house when the fire broke out, about 5 o'clock. Charley Swale and Ballard Gile were a quarter of a mile away but they discovered the fire first through popping of gun cartridges and gave the alarm. They and Benham and Johnny Moore, who was ploughing for Benham in an adjoining field, tried to save some part of the property but were unsuccessful. The building and contents, including \$80 in currency, were totally consumed, leaving Benham for the time being destitute. A violin worth \$200 was among the articles destroyed.
