only damages his property at the point of the diversion but will also injure Bend and important timber interests along the river, that is a plain exhibition of bad faith with the state as well as with himself.

I repeat it, there is no objection to the company's proceeding with any or all its reclamation works according to its contracts. It is trying to do otherwise, thus injuring other important interests, and complains because it is prevented.

Its pretense that Mr. Drake is "holding up" irrigation development, is merely raising a cloud of dust to conceal its real designs.

When the company proceeds under the terms of its contracts it will find no trouble from Mr. Drake. Until that time Mr. Drake's interest is right in line with those of other citizens of this region and of the state at large—to make the irrigation company observe its obligations.
