WANTED-A CONGRESSMAN.

The primary law affords an opportunity for the various yearning candidates to get before the people, but what if the people should desire the services of men who do not care to scramble for office?

Men who give us the best service in public office are those who are not consumed with the desire for a soft snap—who usually are not office seekers. Your professional office seeker is a pliant tool who cannot afford to have convictions.

In the matter of congressional service, we have several men who are seeking the people. Whom are the people seeking? Or don't the people care?

The most effective representation this district ever had in congress was given by M. A. Moody, but he is not now a candidate, and the Oregonian says he will not be.

Crook county has no candidate for congress at this time. Will not the people of the counties that do have proper congressional timber see to it that such candidates are brought out?

SENATORS BY POPULAR VOTE.

One of the most important features of the new primary law is that provision which practically requires candidates for the legislature to pledge themselves to vote for the people's choice for United States senator.

viction has been growing that the present system of choosing senators leaves their election too easily in the hands of powerful corporate interests, which manipulate the election for their own selfish ends.

When the forefathers were framing the constitution there were two powerful interests represented in the assembly hall—one having great faith in the people and determined to put as much governmental power in their hands as possible; the other still possessing a tinge of the old monarchical ideas, and fearful to a certain extent of a democratic government.

The conviction now is, after years of experience, that such an arrangement places the senate too far away from the people. They are too independent; too greatly influenced by those forces asking for special legislation.

OREGON POLITICAL INFORMATION

(Compiled by the Secretary of State and Attorney-General.)

Registration. Registration books opened by county clerks Tuesday, January 2, 1906. Registration books closed for primary election, April 10, 5 p. m.

Direct Primary Election. County clerks give notice of primary election not later than March 27. Last day for filing petitions, for placing names on ballot for state, congressional and district offices, March 30.

Initiative Petitions. Last day for filing pamphlets advocating measure, December 30, 1905. Last day for filing initiative petitions, February 3, 1906.

General Election. Last day for filing certificates of nomination for state officers by assembly of electors, April 19. Last day for filing nominating petitions for state offices, May 4.

General Election, June 4. Petitions for nominations of district officers, such as circuit judge, district attorney, joint senator and joint representative, must be filed in the office of secretary of state, and not in the office of county clerks, and the dates governing nominations for state officers are applicable.
