THAT SCHOOL QUESTION.

At its session of 1903 the state legislature enacted a new code of laws regulating the administration of district school affairs.

"When a vacancy shall occur in the office of director, the clerk shall forthwith call a meeting of the remaining member, or members, who shall at once fill the vacancy from among the qualified voters of the district."

Acting under the provisions of the above section, which were set forth in pamphlets distributed by the state superintendent to all school districts, the members of the school board of District No. 12 recently elected Dr. C. W. Merrill to fill the vacancy caused by the removal of J. M. Lawrence to Roseburg.

"When a vacancy shall occur in the office of director or clerk in a district of the second or third class, a special school meeting to fill such vacancy shall be called in accordance with section 3380 of Bellinger & Cotton's Annotated Codes and Statutes of Oregon."

District No. 12 is in the third class. Section 3380, B. & C. provides for the method of giving notice of school meeting.

This amendment became operative February 22nd, 1905. It would appear, therefore, that in electing Dr. Merrill, the board, not having notice of the new law, acted without authority.

Capitalists Buy Water Power.

It is reported that the Sherar Falls on the Deschutes river, one of the finest water powers in the state, has been bought by San Francisco capitalists, who will develop it.

Chalk Talk at Laidlaw.

F. Milo Lobdell will give a chalk talk tonight at Laidlaw, the pro-

ceeds of which will go to the public schools of that place. A merry party of Bend people have planned to visit the neighbors to the north and will leave about 6:30 for Laidlaw to help swell Mr. Lobdell's audience.

Two Miles of Good Road.

Oregon's senior senator, C. W. Fulton, has become one of the most ardent good roads champion in the city of Washington. When the federal government made an offer, through Samuel Hill, to place two miles of thoroughly modern road in Oregon, at such place as the senator would suggest, the latter named Pendleton and Salem, as central for the two great divisions of the state.

Can Take Lien Land.

At last the settlers on the Northern Pacific over-land land grant are assured justice, after years of waiting. Senator Fulton has put through the senate a bill to allow all settlers who took this grant land between the ruling of the interior department declaring that they had the right to do so, and the decision of the supreme court reversing this ruling, the privilege of taking lien land. The senator believes he can put it through the house, with proper assistance.

\$200,000 for a Horse.

James R. Keene has refused an offer of \$200,000 for Sysouby, the star galloper of the 1905 races. This is the highest price ever offered for a horse, being \$12,000 more than was paid for Flying Fox, the English thoroughbred, and \$50,000 more than was ever paid in the United States.

Will Drill for Oil.

D. W. Barnett and F. M. Loveland are making preparations to begin drilling for oil inside of a month. Mr. Loveland and Frank Forest have ordered a large oil drill, which they expect in about two months. In the meantime Mr. Loveland will drill with the machine he now has on hand.

The earliest spring chickens boasted by anyone so far this year have made their appearance in L. H. McCann's henry. Seven downy little chicks were hatched yesterday.

OREGON POLITICAL INFORMATION

(Compiled by the secretary of state and Attorney-General.)

Registration.

Registration books opened by county clerks, Tuesday, January 2, 1906. Registration books close for primary election, April 10, 5 p. m.

Direct Primary Election.

County clerks give notice of primary election not later than March 21. Last day for filing petitions, for placing names on ballot for state, congressional and district offices, March 21.

Initiative Petitions.

Last day for filing pamphlets advocating measures, December 24, 1905. Last day for filing initiative petitions, February 3, 1906.

General Election.

Last day for filing certificates of nomination for state offices by assembly of electors, April 19, 1906. Last day for filing nominating petitions for state offices, May 1.

General Election, June 4.

Petitions for appointments of district officers, such as circuit judge, district attorney, joint writer and joint representative, must be filed in the office of secretary of state, and not in the office of county clerks, and the dates governing nominations for state officers are applicable.

Bad Wreck on O. R. & N.

The worst wreck in the history of the O. R. & N. happened Tuesday morning at Bridal Veil, a small station between The Dalles and Portland. The Chicago-Portland express ran into the rear end of the Spokane flyer, which was standing on the track at Bridal Veil, and telescoped the rear sleeper.

More buildings collapsed during the week from the heavy weight of snow on the roofs. Schwartz & Budelman's warehouse went down and some goods were more or less damaged. They will lose considerable grain.

STEAMER BLOWN TO PIECES.

The steamer Regulator, which has been plying on the Columbia river for a number of years, blew up Wednesday, Dec. 31, while she was on the ways at St. Johns being repaired.

Second Engineer De Monte W. Wade and his assistant, Merrill B. Steynton, were killed and Daniel Reid, a ship carpenter, was seriously injured.

The cause of the explosion will probably never be definitely known. It is believed, however, that one of the two men who were killed ignored the order prohibiting smoking.

Men in other parts of the ship were startled to see a great tongue of flame burst from the forward part of the vessel and immediately there was a thunderous report.

The flames shot high in the air. Men leaped for their lives. The 18 carpenters and laborers employed by the shipyard and the five deck hands jumped from the vessel to the flats below.

The boat was completely destroyed.
