Water for irrigation will be furnished from the pipe system and the open ditches belonging to The Bend Water, Light & Power Co. at the following rates, payable monthly in advance.

First 1000 square foot area—75c  
Second 1000 square foot area—50c  
Each additional 1000 feet—25c

All applications must be made to said company for the above services, when ditches will be constructed in the streets or alleys and suitable head-gate boxes will be furnished at the expense of the water company who will have control of same. No one will be allowed to obstruct or interfere with the ditches by placing boxes therein. This work must be done under the supervision of the water company.

No charge will be made for lawn sprinkling with hose held in the hand, with nozzle attached, during the season of 1906, but irrigation through a hose will be charged for at the above rates.
