EXPLANATION NEEDED.

Against the new court house discussion the Prineville Journal attacks the position taken by The Bulletin and the Madras Pioneer and makes a few rather rash statements, which need further explanation.

The Journal contends that those signing a petition for a new court house pay the greater part of the taxes. Now let's see! It figures \$49,111 in taxes paid by the county residents, of which \$24,818.72 is paid by the above named petitioners.

The Journal also lays emphasis on the fact that the petition for a court house carries the signatures of heavy taxpayers from Western Crook. No doubt this is true but an easy manner in which to satisfy the suspicious is to publish the complete list.

It may be that a new court house is badly needed. It may be that a majority of the taxpayers favor such a plan, but signatures of 500 protestors secured within a few hours after the news became known does not strengthen this contention.

The real objection is to the methods of secrecy employed by the county court. The Journal says that during the March term of court it contracted to publish the proceedings of the court, but the first hint it makes regarding a new court house is in its issue of May 24; 22 days after the court called for bids, and six days after the published notice.

What the people want now and hereafter is a full published report of all the moneys in the various funds in the county treasury, a statement explaining in detail the

tax levy, and then they will know what their taxes are being paid for and how their money is being spent. This is a just and reasonable demand, and one that prevails in other states. Take the people into your confidence and convince them that a new court house is the best thing for the county and there will be no "strenuous objections."

Prineville is just now prone to lay the present discussion to what it calls Bend's and Madras' desire for a county seat. We believe a move to change county lines at the present time would meet with disapproval by the majority.

Inspectors appointed by President Roosevelt to examine into sanitary conditions in the big meat packing houses of Chicago report a state of filth and nastiness in the killing and handling of meat that is hard to believe.

The president in submitting this report to congress recommends drastic measures. General Miles' attack upon the "embalmed beef" outrage, which he said was responsible for a large number of deaths among the soldiers, during the Spanish-American war, is being vindicated by these recent inspections.

The petition laid before Judge Bradshaw praying for an injunction restraining the county court from letting contracts for a new court house met with a favorable response and the injunction was served against the court Saturday. And now the court says the bids were all rejected because they were excessively high!! What a careful court!!!

Is This Treason.

Max Lueddemann, in the Madras Pioneer, asks if it is treason for Western Crook to desire a hand in the county's management. Evidently 200 and more of Crook county's voters, who signed that remonstrating petition, believe that such desires are not treasonable.
