The first of November the D. I. & P. will put on a force of men to clean and repair their canals. Silt, rubbish, etc. that has accumulated during the summer will be removed and all leaks plugged up. When this work is finished, the crew will probably be used in building laterals under both the Pilot Butte and Central Oregon canals.

The train on which Mr. and Mrs. John Trisler came West was held up by train robbers last week not far from Ogden. The robbers did not get much booty, however, and did not molest the passengers. Mr. and Mrs. Trisler are the parents of Mrs. E. C. Park of Redmond and will spend the winter with their daughter in Oregon.

Tom Sharp and Harry Corbett, who with Jim Overturf and "Bill" Brock had been hunting bear in the up-river country for the past 10 days, returned to Bend Wednesday after bagging two black bears. Mr. Corbett said they got track of a huge bear, "the father of all bears" as he called it, probably the famous old grizzly, and followed it for some time but was finally forced to give it up. Messrs. Overturf and Brock are still enjoying the sports of the chase.

A large hunting party left Bend Monday morning for a bear hunt in the up-river country. It was composed of Mr. and Mrs. A. M. Drake, Dr. U. C. Coc, A. L. Goodwillie, Attorney C. S. Wood of Portland and daughter Liza and Miss Catherine Burns. Charley Cotter went as cook and W. P. Vandeventer as guide. Thursday Attorney Wood returned to Bend on his way to Portland, having been summoned home by a telegram. C. E. Barney drove up and brought Mr. Wood back to Bend. The rest of the party will hunt several days longer.

There is a great scarcity of labor in the Bend country. Ranchers are looking for men, carpenters are

busy and the saw mills have difficulty to keep a crew large enough to keep the mills running. Many buildings are being erected in the surrounding country and every day several loads of lumber are hauled from the Bend mills. Similar reports come from the Hightower & Smith, the Dorrance and the Sisters saw mills, all reporting a large sale of lumber. Many acres of land are being cleared and prepared for next year's crop. This is all development work, and no man need be idle.

Much land is being sold by the D. I. & P. company this fall. Yesterday Frank Glass was in Bend with C. C. Close of Grangeville, N. D., and J. S. Smith of Coeur d'Alene, Idaho. These gentlemen bought land a few miles east of Bend and will move onto their new possessions at once. Mr. Glass also stated that Dr. Ellis and brother of Reardon, Wash., had purchased the old Glen Hendrickson ranch northeast of Bend and would move onto the ranch next month. Young Bros. of Coulee City, Wash., had purchased land near the Hendrickson ranch and will settle on it next winter or in the spring.

Hon. E. B. King of Sandusky, Ohio, arrived in Bend Monday. Judge King is interested in the Deschutes Telephone company and came to attend to business matters. The judge and W. E. Guerin, Jr., were formerly law partners in the East. Mr. King is a father of Clifford King an engineer formerly in the employ of the D. I. & P. company at Bend and who is now employed by the government on its Minidoka project in Idaho. While coming West, Judge King visited the lands under this project and he is also well acquainted with the West in general. He states that in his opinion the Bend country has more opportunities and better prospects for a bright future than any other section of the West. He left Thursday morning to return to the East.
