Alfalfa Seed.
Seed of alfalfa averages larger than red clover seed and shows less tendency to purple in its coloring. Good seeds are of an obscure greenish or reddish yellow. Defective seeds are brown and generally shriveled, as in clover. The shape is not very constant, but in all good samples there are frequently decidedly kidney shaped seeds, strongly convex on one side and concave on the other. From these the shape ranges to short, wide seeds, sometimes decidedly truncate oblique at the larger end. A typical seed measures 0.69 by 0.65 by 0.04 inch.

No Grain in the Orchard.
There are many ways of caring for an orchard. We work our land in corn as long as possible, in order to cultivate the trees and keep the land clear. This is to prevent us being troubled by rabbits. Where there are no trees or grass we can put the richness back into the soil with clover. If the land is rich this clover may be cut for hay; if poor it should be left and turned under to enrich the land as much as possible. Never plant any of the small grains in the orchard. Growth is the most necessary item for the young tree.—T. H. Todd, Missouri.

New Mail Service Needed.
Culver and Lamonta, seven miles apart, have the banner mail connection of the entire service to the Deschutes river district, where each office boasts of the superlativeness of its poor service. The shortest mail schedule time from Culver to Lamonta and return, seven miles each way, is just six days and this splendid time is only possible when the mails connect as scheduled. A letter from Culver addressed to Lamonta must first go to Shaniko, then back to Grizzly, then out to Lamonta; the reply from Lamonta reaches Grizzly in time to miss the stage; leaves next day for Shaniko in time to miss the stage again and on the evening of the third day from Lamonta reaches Culver having traveled over 200 miles in the round trip.—Madras Pioneer.
