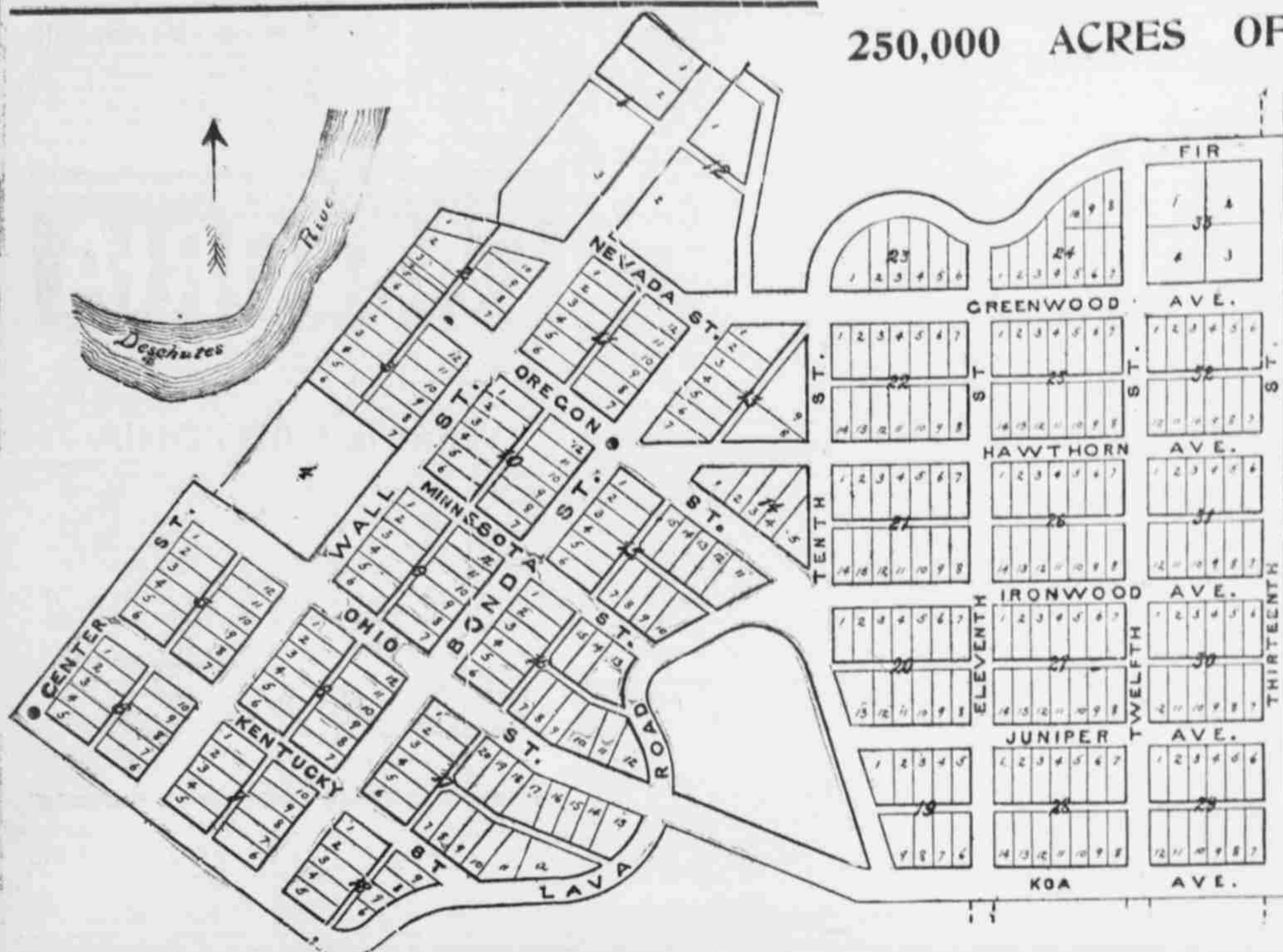

required. The important thing to remember is to keep the top layer of soil well pulverized by frequent cultivations and to supply enough water to produce moist soil beneath this surface mulch. The amount of moisture in the soil around the roots should vary as little as possible, except when the tubers are beginning to form, when it should be increased, since this is the critical stage in the life of the plant and more water is required.

Irrigation practice.—The most common mistake in the irrigation of potatoes is to turn in a large head in each furrow, permit it to flow rapidly to the bottom of the rows, and then shut it off. This way of applying the water wets only the surface layer, and if it is not followed up immediately by cultivation a couple of days of sunshine will rob the soil of most of the water which has been applied and seal over the surface with a hard crust. In this condition the crops soon begin to suffer, and the unskilled farmer fancies that the only remedy lies in applying more water. A better plan is to turn only a small amount of water into a deep furrow and permit it to run without stopping for hours or even for half a day. In this way the top layer is not saturated, the soil around the roots and beneath them receives a larger supply, and the surface may be cultivated shortly after each irrigation, so as to check evaporation and retain the moisture in the soil for the benefit of the crop.

FACTS VS. FICTION.

The Bulletin is publishing "all manner of lies against Prineville." None, however, are directly mentioned. State particular cases, Mr. Street, and prove them. That would be better argument than broad assertions which anyone can make. In the words of the street, "It's up to you."

8th. Street not only makes statements that will not bear scrutiny, but he does not quote The Bulletin truthfully. He says The Bulletin claimed 4000 people in the proposed Deschutes county. The Bulletin never claimed any such thing. What it said was: "It is safe to say that Western Crook has close to 4,000 population." Western Crook includes the Madras and Agency Plains country, which are not included in the "proposed Deschutes county." An incomplete enumeration of the new county shows 1925 people. The Madras country is much denser populated and has easily 2200 people. So The Bulletin's statement was correct and Street is again shown up as an irresponsible babbler.

10th. Street says that every foot of timber in the proposed county can be removed in 10 years (with the consequent loss of taxable property) and in saying it brands himself as an ignoramus. There are from 12 to 15 billions of feet of

timber in the new county, with a total of 50 billions in the entire belt. The total cut of all mills in the United States was 30 billion feet in 1905, with 11,566 mills cutting. At this rate it would take considerable more than a thousand mills to cut the complete belt in 10 years. In 1905, Oregon cut 1,262,000,000 feet, with 319 mills at work. Thus it would take more than all the mills of Oregon, working in Deschutes county alone, to cut its 15 billion feet in 10 years. And how many do you suppose will be installed here—20 or 25 at the most. The above figures are taken from a government report, "Lumber cut for 1905," published Dec. 21, 1906. It shows up in its completeness, Street's utter ignorance of the matter he attempts to discuss, and shows him to be a babler with little regard for fact or sense.

The above takes up the statements, one by one, made by the reverend gentleman. It proves conclusively that the opposition to county division has not—and cannot—advance one valid reason why there should not be a division of the county. It further shows that the method of their opposition is an utter disregard of facts and truth.

The Bulletin is content to rest its case with the public as to its standard for veracity.
