Since the man who makes the threat to dynamite a house or kidnap a child is known he provides an alibi in advance. He is usually in communication with some other fellow of his breed located in another town. When It becomes necessary to terrorize the Italians of his own territory he sends for this man and intrusts the execution of his orders to him. In the meantime he slips out of town himself, perhaps to do a favor in kind.

"Black Hand Italians have a counterpart in America in the 'yeggmen,' the worst type of thieving, murderous tramps. There is no organization of yeggs, but they have a community of interest, a code of unwritten laws and a certain patter of speech that makes them known to each other. A 'squealer' always gets short shrift. The certainty of sudden death makes them keep their mouths shut when arrested and thus convictions are hard to secure."-Pittsburg Dispatch.
