Wiest reports that only about two per cent of the strawberries were damaged and five per cent of the currants. Such a small loss will hardly be noticed if no further damage occurs. Mr. Wiest had water flowing through a part of his currant bushes and these escaped injury entirely, a fact that should be noted and remembered.
