Announcements have been received in Bend of the marriage of Mr. Charles Hull McNie to Miss Alda Johnson on Wednesday, May 15, at Winona, Minn. Mr. and Mrs. McNie will be at home after July 15 at Kentwood, La.

Preparations for the Fourth are going steadily forward and all committees are hard at work. The first batch of advertising matter has been printed at The Bulletin office and is being distributed. Every loyal citizen will help to advertise the event, which is going to be one of the biggest and best celebrations ever seen in Central Oregon.

News reaches Bend that Francis Marion was declared "not guilty" by the jury at Lakeview before which he was tried on the charge of selling a team, harness and hack not belonging to him, the outfit being the property of "Billy" Robison of Bend. It was impossible to get full particulars. The affair will be a heavy loss to Robison, the value of the outfit and expenses aggregating several hundred dollars.

Bend was visited by quite a severe electrical storm and a heavy downpour of rain Tuesday afternoon. Two large pine trees south of the P. B. D. office were struck by lightning and a clean strip ripped from the top to the ground. The fuses to all the 'phones on the local exchange excepting four were burned out, as were also all the long distance 'phones. The storm was quite extended in scope as it also visited Prineville and burned out all the 'phones there except three. About an inch of water fell.

In order to get a greater fall to the flume that feeds his irrigation wheel, Henry Linster is moving the wheel several yards down stream. The removal necessitates some heavy blasting in order to clear a way for the flume. Ed Halvorsen has had charge of the blasting. This irrigating wheel is a clever contrivance by which the force of the water turns a water wheel. The water wheel furnishes the power to keep an endless chain in operation which carries a number of large tin cups. As the chain revolves, the cups dip up water and carry it to the top of a derrick some 30 or 40 feet high where the water is dumped into a flume and carried by gravity onto the Linster field on the west side of the river. It is a first rate irrigation plant on a small scale.

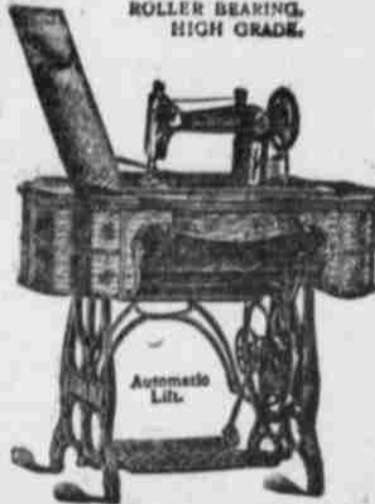
