HOLDS ANNUAL MEETING.

School District No. 12 Chooses One Director and a Clerk.

At the annual meeting of school district No. 12 held in the B. M. hall last Monday afternoon, Dr. U. C. Coe was elected director for a term of three years and C. S. Benson was unanimously chosen to succeed himself as clerk.

When nominations for director were asked for, the names of Dr. Coe and Dr. Turley were the only ones placed before the meeting. The ballot showed 47 votes polled, of which Dr. Coe received 39 and Dr. Turley 8. Dr. Turley, who was absent, afterwards stated that he did not want the office and had he been present would not, under any consideration, have allowed his name to go before the meeting, and did not know it was to be presented. By motion Chairman Goodwillie was instructed to cast the unanimous ballot of the meeting in favor of C. S. Benson for clerk.
