Early last Sunday morning the Oregon Central canal broke through its banks a short distance below the main flume. The escaping water ran beneath a short flume in the Pilot Butte canal, washed out its supports and let it fall, thus turning the flow of both canals through a ravine back to the river, which it riled up in great shape for a short time. As soon as Mr. Smith, the flume tender, saw the break he hurried to the headgate and shut off the water from both canals. Men and teams were put at work repairing the break as soon as possible with the result that water was turned into the Pilot Butte canal about 4:30 o'clock Thursday afternoon. It will be turned into the Oregon Central this afternoon. The break was caused by a "sink hole" opening in the bottom of the Oregon Central through which the entire flow of water in the canal escaped.

The committee recently appointed by the Bend chamber of commerce to draft a constitution met yesterday afternoon and performed that duty. They also drew up a communication to the city council, which will be presented at the council's next meeting, asking the council to request the Bend Water, Light & Power Co. to make the city an offer as to the sale of its plant to the city.

The big well drill that put down the deep well at Redmond was in Bend on the night of the 3rd on its way to the Baldwin ranch where they will drill for artesian water. The machine is already set up, and operations will be commenced as soon as water is again turned into the Central Oregon canal, from which the drillers can get the necessary supply of water. The well will be sunk a little north and west of the big barn.

An action that is pleasing many Bend people is the reduction in water rates for irrigation made by the new management. Thursday J. H. Oneill, in behalf of himself and several other water users, went to Messrs. Steidl and Sawhill and stated that, while they wished very much to use the company's water for irrigation, they could not pay the high rate of \$4 for one lot, \$7 for two, \$9 for three and \$2 for each additional lot. These parties agreed to build their own laterals without expense to the company and made the company an offer of \$4 per lot, and the offer was accepted.

**Notice to Water Users.**

In order to enable us to have a full tank at night for fire protection all sprinkling with hose and nozzle, held in hand, must be done only between the hours of 4 and 5 o'clock p. m. No water for sprinkling or irrigation will be furnished from pipe line where same may be furnished by gravity flow. Disregard of this notice will be sufficient cause for shutting off the water.

One long whistle by pumping plant will indicate time to commence sprinkling; two whistles, time to stop.

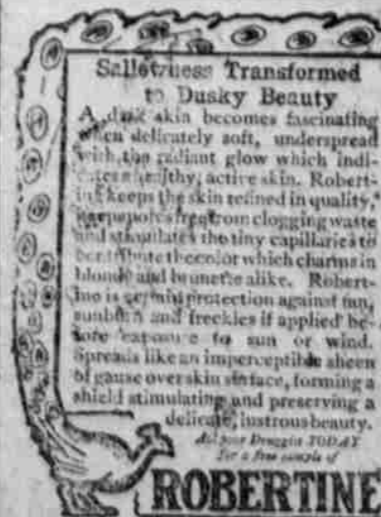
