Some are inclined to think that the bird Mr. Wiest saw was a pin-tail grouse, which resembles a prairie chicken very closely, but Mr. Wiest says he has hunted both grouse and prairie chicken too often to be mistaken. He asserts positively that the bird he saw was the ordinary prairie chicken so common in the Middle West states. It is said that a few of these fine game birds have been inhabiting the Moro section for a few years past and one or more of them have probably strayed into this section. One of the characteristics of these birds is to follow cultivation as a new country is developed, taking up their abode and feeding in the stubble fields. If these birds are coming into the Bend country they should be protected, and hunters should leave them alone, until they become quite numerous.

WORK WITH THE PIGSKIN.

Football Enthusiasm Is Growing and Bend Will Have a Strong Team.

Last Sunday the football enthusiasts of the town got together and put in several hours practicing on the old base ball grounds. In the morning the time was given mostly to the practice of signals, passing the ball, and kindred work, but in the afternoon the boys got down to hard work, two elevens were made up and the two teams faced each other to determine which was the better aggregation. At the end of the game the score stood 10 to 15 in favor of "the" team, the scrubs having made two touchdowns, the other eleven, three. The two teams made a very creditable showing considering that it was their first day's practice.

Prineville has accepted the challenge sent to them by the Bend boys and will have an eleven ready for games a few weeks later. The management of the Crook county fair would not put up anything as a purse to secure a game during the fair, and consequently what games are pulled off will be played later. The Bend boys are working hard to get in proper condition. One of the stunts they practice is a run every few nights of a mile or two in order to toughen themselves and strengthen their "wind". They have ordered suits which they expect here in time for next Sunday's practice, and the matter of organization is going ahead smoothly. The line-up of the team cannot be given, as the personnel has not yet been chosen and there are several aspirants for the honored positions.

Football training, when properly given, is a good thing for a man. It strengthens and hardens him, develops his lungs, makes him think quickly and act accordingly. It steadies his nerves and gives him better control of himself—if it doesn't give him a hole in the ground with six feet of earth on top of him. But that's one of the chances of the game. So let's help the good work along.

The local team are in hopes that two or three elevens will be organized in the county and that games can be secured with each of them.
