BOUND OVER TO GRAND JURY

Prineville Man Sends Obscene Literature to Young Girls.

Bert Salnave, a Prineville stage driver who was recently arrested for sending obscene literature to young girls through the Prineville postoffice, was given a hearing before U. S. Commissioner Ellis; says the Journal, and bound over to appear before the United States grand jury at Portland.

Salnave was charged with violating the postal laws, which provide that "no person shall print, write, or cause to be printed or written, lewd, obscene or matter of like nature and deposit same in a postoffice for mailing or delivery," etc.

The evidence produced was sufficient to hold the prisoner for the grand jury. His bail was placed at \$500, in default of which he was locked up pending the arrival of officers from the federal court.
