Ivy Poisoning.
A good, quick cure for ivy poison is hot wafer. Make a mop of a soft rag, folded several times, dip it in hot, not warm, water, and apply to the affected part for three or four minutes. Just as hot as can be borne without scalding. Repeat often; do not rub, touch gently. Afterward apply a little of any good cold cream to cool the skin and stop the itching.

Health For the Swine.
The time for hog troubles is close at hand. The fellow who is too busy to use a disinfectant occasionally, and by this method keep the swine free from lice, and who thinks his hogs are as well off in a dry lot as they would be with the range of a clover field, will likely be the first one in his locality to find "Cholera"—Farm Journal.

Well Ordered Pasture.
A well ordered farm should have a hog pasture, run for the cows and pigs and one for the calves. If there are a few sheep they may run with the cows. If much of a flock, they need a separate lot. Often the calves and pigs keep up the same pasture. This will do, but it is not desirable. It is better, though not necessary, to have the cows and pigs separated. The playfulness of calves is apt to distress the calves.—Humboldt Dairy Farmer.

Monkeys' Rouge.
"Komala" is the vernacular name of the red dye produced from the glands of the mature fruit of a tree named "Mallotus philippinensis," which is also called the "monkey face tree" because monkeys paint their faces red by rubbing them with the fruit.
