Raise Clover and Make Money.

CORVALLIS, Oregon—While on a trip of 10 days on a wheel I visited 33 towns besides seeing the country and the crops I find the farmers that are making the most money and doing it the easiest are the ones that raise clover. The successful ones are seeding the largest part of their ranches to clover and carrying more stock. Some handle cows and sell the cream and milk, and others raise sheep, cattle, and hogs.

My idea is that this Willamette valley is a wonderful hog country. With this even climate pigs can come any time of the year and do well. With the clover, rape, and kale fields for them to run on they can be fed very cheaply to what they can in the Eastern states where there are long cold winters.

To give an idea what people are doing along the clover line: I know of some farms of 400 acres and most of them are sown to clover. One neighborhood threshed 200,000 pounds and still others expect to have a car load of clover seed this next fall. I am making it a business to keep track of the clean clover fields. When I buy it is the best that is wanted.

Any one that is interested in fine farms and clean fields and good crops, fine improvements, everything in good shape, can find those farms in the Holland settlement three miles northeast of Forest Grove. Any one having a disgust for farming would get that knocked out by visiting this settlement, seeing their homes so comfortable and everything about the ranch so handy and neat. Farmer, I want to say that if you had seen what I have you would surely go to raising clover, more hogs, sheep, and cattle which will make more money and build up the land at the time with much less work. Let the other fellow do the hard work, hiring hands and keeping lots of horses and machinery to plow, bind, and thresh wheat to haul to market, and burn his straw, and curse his country because his farm does not produce. Oh, if people only knew how much they are robbing their land by this work they would surely change. We want more stock, more manure spreaders and clover,

hullers, less plows, binders and hard work, with more profit.

I wish to correct a mistake I made some time ago. I said hogs would not kill artichokes after they got started but I had hogs in my artichokes all winter and they completely killed them. Do not be afraid to plant plenty of artichokes; you can not get rid of them if you do not pasture too heavy with hogs and they will stay for years without replanting. I also said that artichokes would yield 300 bushels to the acre; they will yield 1000 bushels to the acre on extra good land and any one doubting it write to me and I will refer him to the field and he may see for himself.


I want to impress on your minds first, last, and all of the time, to sow clover. I know it pays any one that is faint-hearted and has no experience. I would be glad to send directions about the sowing and the kinds of soil it needs.

Do not think that I have gone back on vetch. I think there is no better cow hay than vetch hay. It really is a forerunner of clover; it helps prepare the land for clover. In my opinion vetch seed will be a little higher in price next year; even at 8 cents a pound it will pay better than grain in cash besides building up the land.—I. L. Brooks in Pacific Homestead.
