SENATOR FULTON'S ADDRESS.

In his address Monday evening Senator Fulton made several strong points against the democratic party. The first of these—and one of the strongest and most interesting—was where the senator went back to the very beginning of the republican and democratic parties and pointed out the fundamental difference in these two organizations.

Senator Fulton enlarged on this difference in the two parties by showing how the democrats had opposed anti-trust legislation. He maintained that Attorney-General Olney, under Cleveland, held that the federal government could not legislate against a corporation organized under state statutes.

Another strong feature of the senator's address was his reference to legislation favoring the laboring man. He enumerated law after law that had been enacted in behalf of labor by republican congresses.

Senator Fulton also dwelt on the Bryan anti-injunction plank and showed how such a law would react against the laboring man by simply postponing indefinitely final decisions in injunction cases.

first from one "paramount" issue to another—in 1896, free coinage of silver; in 1900, anti-imperialism; later, government ownership of railroads; and now, guarantee of bank deposits.

The address was considered weak, even by many republicans, in one or two particulars. Senator Fulton made no direct reference, whatever, to the magnificent work of the Roosevelt administration.

The strength of Senator Fulton's address consisted in his admirable presentation of the fundamental difference in the two parties; in showing the record of republican legislation in opposition to trusts, and legislation in favor of labor.

Is it right to make one man pay for the poor business judgment or rascality of another man? Taft says it is not, and that is one of the reasons why he condemns Bryan's plan for enforced guarantee of bank deposits.

"The remedy proposed by Mr. Bryan will make the conservative banker pay for the negligence, carelessness, lack of confidence or dishonesty of the failing banker."

"To say, as Mr. Bryan does, that the postal saving bank system is more socialistic than this is to give a curious definition to socialism."

What Bryan proposes is to tax all national banks and thus raise a fund from which losses are paid whenever a national bank fails.
