### LIKES BEND COUNTRY.

Says Fruit Will Be Successfully Grown Here as Country Grows Older.

A. F. Shireman, who recently came to Bend from Victor, Idaho, with the intention of locating, is very much pleased with Bend and vicinity. In an interview with The Bulletin Mr. Shireman told of conditions that existed in his former home, which, when compared with those that exist in this section, should be very encouraging to Deschutes valley settlers.

Mr. Shireman lived in Teton Basin, which has an elevation of 7,000 feet. The Basin consists of a valley 10 or 12 miles wide bounded on both sides by high mountains. In that valley they raise an abundance of all kinds of small fruit and many young orchards are coming into bearing and are yielding an excellent quality of apples. In fact the valley raises practically all the fruit it can consume, and the supply is increasing as the development of that section grows older.

Last spring Mr. Shireman received a letter from his cousin, Mrs. E. A. Griffin of Bend. In the letter she stated that crops were up and looking well here. At the same time the crops in the Teton Basin were covered with snow, so Mr. Shireman states.

The encouraging feature of Mr. Shireman's interview is that if fruit can be raised at an elevation of 7,000 feet and in a climate such as he describes, it surely can be grown at Bend and vicinity, where the climate is milder and the elevation ranges from 3,000 to 3,600 feet only. It has already been demonstrated by L. D. Wiest, J. I. West and others living on the segregation that small fruit can be grown here in great abundance, and it is quite evident that apples and other fruit will also yield well as soon as the orchards are old enough to bear.

Mr. Shireman has been looking over several tracts of land and will undoubtedly locate near Bend.
