A BENEFICIAL CONVENTION.

Sunday School Workers Are Helped by Their Meeting at Prineville.

The third annual Sunday school convention for Crook county was held in Prineville November 13-15, with delegates from the three Crook county districts, for the purpose of making Sunday school effort more effective in the supreme work of the salvation of souls. It will surprise many to learn the strength of the Crook county schools, there being some thirty, with a membership slightly in excess of a thousand. The state organization was represented by the field secretary, Rev. Chas. A. Phipps of Prineville.

The Prineville workers set out the best in the land for the entertainment of the out-of-town delegates. Mrs. Belknap, vice-president of the Prineville district, having made, prior to the convention, arrangements for all visitors.

The first afternoon was devoted to the "Problems of the Rural School," led by Mr. Lawrence A. Hunt of Madras, and in the evening Mr. Phipps lectured on the seven evils of the Sunday school, viz: (1) Unpreparedness—lack of preparation on all hands for the work. (2) Tardiness. (3) Proseyness—everything being done in the same old sing-song way Sunday after Sunday. (4) Laziness—no one willing to do anything that can be shovelled off on some one else. (5) Inattention. (6) Ineffectiveness—a school which is not winning souls for Christ is not fulfilling its mission. (7) Poverty—patrons see that public schools have splendid equipment for all purposes but permit the Sunday schools, to which in many cases are entrusted the sole responsibility of caring for the spiritual welfare of those who have no religious instruction at home, to drag along without appropriate maps, blackboards, helps, and other equipment essential to the success of a school.

On Saturday the following officers were elected for the ensuing year: President, J. B. Shipp; vice-president, F. H. Sherwood; secretary, Mrs. C. I. Winnek; treasurer, Mr. H. R. Horgan. In the evening Mr. Phipps presented the other side of the question in an interesting and instructive address on the "Seven Elements of Success of the Sunday School," viz: Organization, grading, cradle role, home department, teacher training, passion for souls, adult movement. The next annual convention will be held at Redmond.
