## EFFECTIVE ADVERTISING.

D. I. & P. Co. Is Using Postal Cards Containing Views of Crops.

The D. I. & P. Co. is doing some effective advertising these days by means of postal cards on which are printed half-tone reproductions of photographs of crops grown on irrigated lands in this section. The latest card to be gotten out is one showing a field of oats on the C. H. Ellis farm at Powell Buttes. The oats were sown this season as a nurse crop for alfalfa and did very well, producing three tons of hay to the acre. Printed on the card is a statement by Mr. Ellis, as follows:

To Whom It May Concern: This is to certify that on this field I sowed one bushel of oats and 15 pounds of alfalfa seed per acre June 15, 1908. September 13, 1908, I harvested three tons per acre actual measurement in stack. The land was irrigated before sowing crop and only once after sowing. C. H. ELLIS, Bend, Or.

These postal cards with the different views are used as "follow ups" in the company's advertising campaign, and over 4,000 of them have been used during the past two months.
