Rev. J. T. Moore will hold regular services in the church next Sunday, both morning and evening, to which all are cordially invited.

Roscoe Howard returned to Bend last Thursday after a business visit of some time in Portland. He was accompanied by Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Stearns of Portland who are spending the week in Bend and at the Ten Bar Ranch in which Mr. Stearns is interested.

L. Fox of La Grande, Or., has been spending the past week or 10 days in Bend. Mr. Fox owns lots near E. A. Cast's place in the east part of town and also has invested in an 80-acre tract of ditch land east of Bend. He is quite favorably impressed with our town and may engage in business here.

Other places in the county had colder weather than did Bend. At Prineville the mercury dropped to 29 degrees below; at Laidlaw, 28 below; Montgomery's, 33 below; Wolf Creek, 31 below; Beaver Creek, 31 below; Agency Plains, 26 below. This is the coldest weather reported in the county since 1887.

A genuine Western chinook, accompanied by considerable rain, started in last Thursday and played havoc with the snow for about three days. When it was over there was mighty little of that two feet of snow left throughout the Bend country, but there is now plenty of water over the land. Now watch for reports of washouts and landslides on the railroads.

There will be a meeting held at the home of Mr. Warmstaff next Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock to discuss the advisability of starting a school in the settlement east of town. There is quite a large settlement on what is known locally as "The Burn," with a number of children of school age, and there is more or less agitation for a school in that neighborhood. A large attendance of those interested is desired.

At its last session the county court took the following action in regard to the petition of the Bend school district for exemption from the county high school tax: "Inasmuch as the Crook county boundary board has duly recognized the efficiency of the high school now maintained within school district No. 12, it is hereby ordered that said school district No. 12 be exempt from the tax levy for the Crook county high school, all in accordance with the statutes and code of the state of Oregon."

If his new stable is finished in time, J. H. Wenandy plans to give the biggest dance ever heard of in the Bend country, on the evening of February 22, Washington's birthday. The loft of his new barn will have a floor space of 48x108 feet and the floor will be laid with dressed and matched lumber so as to prevent the sifting of dirt onto the stock below. Mrs. Perry Iams is sick, but we were not informed as to the nature of the illness.

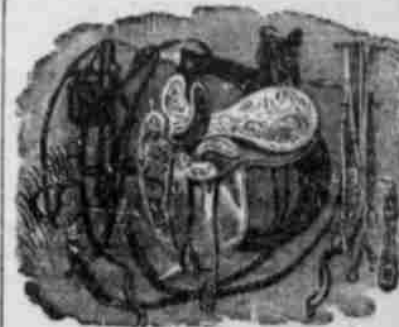
School has been suspended at the Shepherd school house during cold weather.
