Road Supervisor Richardson has a lot of work cut out for him this season. Beginning three miles east of Bend on the Bear Creek road, he will construct 8½ miles of new highway directly east. He will also do seven miles of work on the ice cave road. Some repairing will be done on the Tumalo road. In all, he has 22 miles of road work to attend to.

J. A. Silvertooth of Silver Lake passed through Bend the first of the week with a curiosity in the shape of a buck sheep with a double set of horns. The animal had the usual horns curving upward from the head, and in addition, at the base of each horn, a smaller horn curves outward and downward toward his mouth—one on each side of his head. Silvertooth was taking the sheep to Seattle with the expectation of selling it as a freak.

Already the high school people are laying their plans for next season. In the autumn 25 or more pupils will be enrolled, of which number but four or five will be girls. This means good prospects for athletic teams and with the proper support, there is no reason why this branch of school activity should not prosper. Next year will also see a decided effort made to establish debating and public speaking upon a firm footing.

Mr. E. N. Strong, special representative of the Oregon Life of Portland, Oregon, is in the city for a few days. Mr. Strong has been at Prineville for the last six weeks, and reports the largest business written there by his company ever done in that section of the country by any company in the same length of time. In talking to a reporter for The Bulletin yesterday, Mr. Strong said: "Oregonians are realizing the great benefit of keeping the money heretofore sent to Eastern states where only a small portion returns, at home." We bespeak a large business for Mr. Strong while he is in Bend.

J. W. Howard, the well known stockman and pioneer of Crook county, has been spending the week assessing the tax-payers hereabouts. Mr. Howard called attention to the fact that his son, Roland R. Howard, born and raised in Crook county, was the author of that admirable article that appeared in the Pacific Monthly for May, the "Harriman Fence." This article described the railroadless condition of Eastern Oregon and showed the injustice of keeping it bottled up, as Harriman is doing. The article was widely read in Bend and attracted much favorable comment. Mr. Howard, Jr., is also editor of the department that appears regularly in the above magazine, on development features of the Northwest. He took his degree from Ann Arbor two years ago.

Civil War Relics.

The spirit of the days of '61 seems to hover about the corner of modern Bend where from the window of A. M. Lara's "big store" looks out a rare collection of relics of the civil war. In the window, displayed against

a large American flag, are battle-scarred muskets, sabers that have seen service on the field of Gettysburg, army coats, battered canteens, a pocket-book which saved its owners life by stopping a bullet, and many another historic souvenir.

Several of the exhibits were the property of Col. Fox, of the 101st Illinois, the grandfather of A. M. Lara, who raised his own regiment, entered the war with it numbering 1040 men and disbanded in '64 with but 231 survivors.

In connection with the relics, a curious incident is related by Thomas Tweet, war veteran. It seems that he and H. C. Barney were serving picket duty but a few rods apart when suddenly the "Rebs" swooped down and captured Barney. That was in the sixties. Three months ago Tweet and Barney came face to face on the streets of Bend.

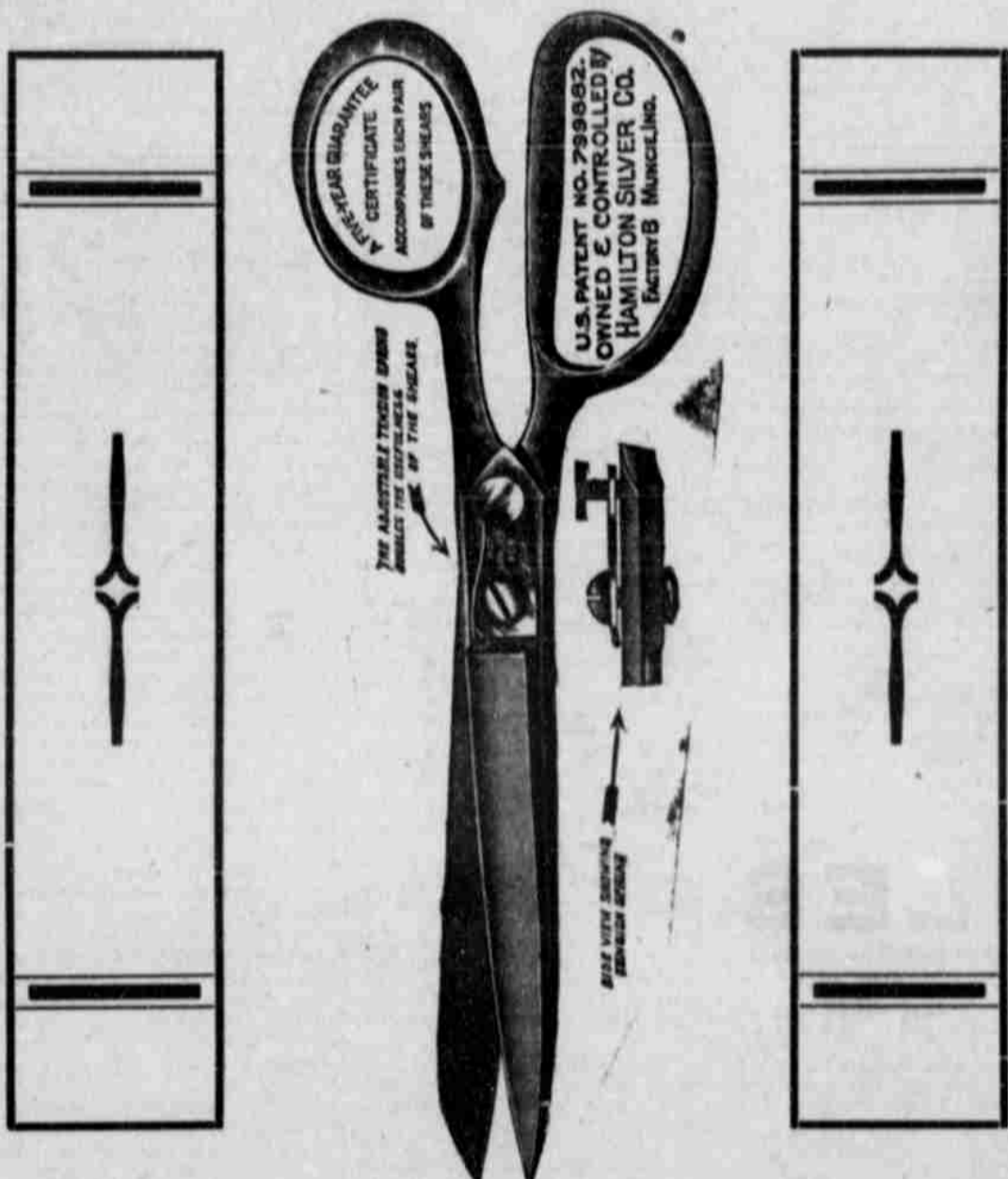
