Salting the Butter.

Good fine dairy sait should be used and never the common coarse barrel sait that is used by many. The salting may be done in the churn when the butter is in the granular form if it is a box or barrel churn. The sait can be sifted on the butter by putting on a part, then revolving the churn halfway over, thus making the butter fall with the salted side down, then sifting on the rest of the sait. Then revolve the churn a few times, after which the butter can be taken out and worked on a butter worker .- C. P. Goodrich.


