Mr. and Mrs. Thos. Ryan came down from their homestead near Fremont the latter part of the week and spent several days in town.

Martin E. Homme, who came to Bend a few weeks ago to play in the band, returned to his home at Glendale, Or., yesterday, not having been able to secure work in his chosen trade.

The Harriman contractors at Shaniko have cast an envious eye on Charley Ethridge's freighting outfit, and, it is understood, will make him an offer either to purchase or hire it.

Charles Stanburrough reports that the closing of the D. I. & P. Co. flume last week resulted in raising the river 6½ inches, as

shown on a gauge in the river at the pumping plant.

According to the Silver Lake Leader cougars are numerous in the Conley hills, northeast of that town. They are killing many colts for the stockmen, having killed seven for the Hayes Bros. alone.

The Central Oregon Realty Company closed a deal last week whereby the Perry Iams place at Powell Buttes was sold to J. B. Whitney of Iowa. The price paid was \$60 an acre, the place containing 40 acres of irrigable land.

The first of the week Carl Ehret sold 35 acres of his ranch adjoining the townsite of Redmond on the north, for \$5,000. This price figures practically \$143 an acre. The place has two acres into orchard and the balance is into crop.

The general land office at Washington has decided the Thornbjornson-Hindman contest in favor of Mrs. Hindman, the case having been appealed from the decision of The Dalles land office, in which the register and receiver rendered opposite opinions.

E. M. Heyburn of Spokane passed through Bend Friday evening on his way to visit his son, J. B. Heyburn, at his up-river homestead. Mr. Heyburn was accompanied by his daughter, Miss Lillian. Mr. Heyburn is a brother of Senator Heyburn of Idaho.

J. D. Davidson, in his capacity as mayor of Bend, has appointed the following men delegates to the National Irrigation Congress, which will be in session at Spokane on August 9 to 14 inclusive: C. M. Redfield, A. M. Drake, C. S. Hudson, Dr. P. H. Dencer, Judge H. C. Ellis.

A. L. Kasson of Seattle spent a few days in Bend during the past week, giving this section a general inspection and at the same time enjoying a sort of an outing. Mr. Kasson met Attorney-General Crawford recently at Seattle, and the attorney-general extended an invitation to Mr. Kasson to accompany him on his trip to Bend.

Dan Heising, who came over yesterday from his ranch at the head of the Matoles, reports that he has sold the place to F. I. McKenna, of Portland, for \$5200, having paid \$3200 for it a year ago. That's not a bad increase for one year. Mr. McKenna bought it for his son, Coe, who will make a summer home of it. The place contains 160 acres.

A. O. Walker was in from his ranch yesterday. He stated that he had leased his place to Williams Bros. for three years, and will leave about December 1 for California. He is more than satisfied with his venture in real estate in the Bend country, and says he expects to see land values here increase rapidly. Crops in his neighborhood are very good this year.

Last Thursday J. I. West removed from his bee hive a super containing 27 boxes of honey. The honey is A1 in quality, clear and white. This is an industry in which more should engage. The bees do quite a necessary work in helping to pollinate fruit blossoms, thus increasing the yield of fruit, and the profit from the honey from a few stands of bees would be no small item.

A. M. Baxter and J. M. Ward, stockmen of the Silver Lake country, were in Bend Saturday on their way to British Columbia to look over that territory with a view to finding a place where plenty of range for stock can be had, and if such a place is found quite a colony of Silver Lake people expect to go there. These stockmen give as their reason for leaving the Silver Lake country the fact that much of the outside range, especially that with water on it, is being fenced by homesteaders, and what is left unfenced is overstocked to the extent that stock do not do so well as in former years.
