Important to Farmers.
"The Business Side of Farming" is the title of a recent publication from the Oregon Agricultural College press. The bulletin is devoted to farm records. It is written in a clear, simple style, and will be easily comprehended by any farmer. This bulletin is published for free distribution.

It is gratifying to note that the state college is taking the lead in this important subject. No phase of agricultural education is more important nor more generally neglected. President Roosevelt and the Rural Commission have remarked, on more than one occasion, that this is one of the defects in rural education. The lack of correct business methods has not only ruined countless farmers, but it often drives the boys off the farm.

Professor Bexell, the author of the bulletin, says in his introduction: "It is a truism to say that the financial side of farming is of the utmost importance. But the fact remains that this side of the world's greatest industry is almost en-

tirely neglected by both the farmer and the schools. Professor Bailey says on this subject: "In visiting practically every farm in one of the counties of New York, we did not find one man who knew how much it cost him to produce milk or to raise any of his crops."
