### GENERAL NEWS NOTES.

**ENLARGE OUTLET TO TULE LAKE.** Government engineers are now at work enlarging the lately discovered outlet to Tule Lake. This outlet seems to lead into a subterranean channel or cavern in the historic lava beds.

With the draining of this lake it is estimated that about 90,000 acres of rich sedimentary soil will be made available for homesteaders. Lost river, the present feeder of Tule Lake, is to be converted into an irrigation canal to transport water from Clear Lake over the Klamath basin country. It is supposed that the outlet to Tule Lake leading into the lava beds finds its way into Fall river, a tributary of the Sacramento.—Lakeview Herald.

### PUSH WORK ON IRRIGATION MAPS.

Work on the maps to be forwarded to the Interior Department, showing the lakes desired to be used as storage reservoirs for the irrigation of this section, is progressing rapidly, and these maps, with the petitions left in this vicinity to be signed by the farmers asking the Reclamation Service to grant to Messrs. Rogers and Rounds the right to use Crescent lake as a storage reservoir for irrigation purposes, will be forwarded to Washington as soon as they are in readiness.—Madras Pioneer.

The Messrs. Rogers and Rounds built the Owyhee and Payette projects in Idaho.

### ONE OF THE DISASTROUS FREAKS.

Among the disastrous freaks of the storm last week was a flood of 10 feet in Deschutes river, an incident never known to happen in that stream since it was discovered more than 100 years ago by white men. It has been on about an even keel all that time, never varying more than 14 inches from its regular height. The flood last week carried out two camps for Twohy Bros. and one for Porter Bros. The crest of the flood at Rohr Villa was 8 feet 9 inches higher than the highest ever before recorded.

### BAD FIRE AT WASCO.

The elegant \$10,000 residence of G. N. Crossfield at Wasco was totally destroyed by fire Sunday night. The origin of the fire is supposed to have been the basement furnace. About 12 cords of dry wood added to the flames as they swept through the building straight up to the roof and the outer parts tumbled in as the fire ascended making an apparently natural flue of the entire structure, consuming everything to the very corners of the room.—Moro Observer.

The firemen of Prineville gave a Thanksgiving ball which netted them \$60.

Redmond people are asking for a new road between that place and Prineville.

An addition to Prineville is being platted, which lies along the road leading to Bend and between the first bridge over Crooked river and the second bridge.

The ladies of the building committee of the Presbyterian church at Redmond gave a Thanksgiving

dinner, the total proceeds of which amounted to \$111.

William Ledford this week sold his timber claim located above Bend to D. L. McKay, who is buying for the Hudson company. The price paid was \$3075.—Prineville Journal.

The Dalles is in the throes of an anti-saloon, anti-neighbor agitation. A municipal league has been organized, some of the most prominent men of the town being members of it, and meetings are being held behind closed doors.

Jake Gillam went down to Silver creek Sunday morning for a little shooting and killed two fine otters. Jake's shooting that morning will net him some cash as the fur of the animals are in prime shape.—Silver Lake Leader.

George Nelson, a brother of W. F. Nelson, recently deceased, who was the first promoter and locator of the Oregon Trunk Line. Was a visitor in town last Saturday from his camp near the mouth of Trout creek, where he has a sub contract on the Oregon Trunk Line.—Madras Pioneer.

The Cornett Stage & Stable Company during the past ten days discontinued bringing express matter from Shaniko on the regular stages on account of bad roads, but sent heavy teams in after the freight. Several cargoes of this matter have arrived during the past few days and the prospect is that the congestion of express and baggage will return to normal.—Journal.
