The cold weather has been play-
ing hob with the water pipes in
Bend. The mains are down only
from 18 inches to two feet, and the
continued cold weather has finally
sent the frost down that far, with
the result that the water in many
of the pipes leading from the mains
to the buildings has been frozen
solid. This has necessitated dig-
ging down to the pipes through the
hard, frozen ground and thawing
them out. Aune Bros. were forced
to uncover the pipes across the en-
tire width of Bond street, and others
have had to do likewise to a greater
or less extent. In some neighbor-
hoods only one faucet remains open
and it is consequently visited by
many for their daily supply of
water. Now don't smile when we
say that this experience is "most
unusual" in Bend.
