CENTRAL OREGON NOTES.

The Lakeview land office reports 900 homestead entries from Jan. 31, 1908, to Jan. 31, 1910.

The C. Sam Smith ranch of 3260 acres, on the Ochoco river, was purchased last week by George H. Russel of Tacoma for \$55,000. The new owner will devote his property to horse raising.

The state land board has ordered the price of all state lands except indemnity lands increased from \$5 to not less than \$7 50 an acre. Indemnity land will continue to sell at \$13 an acre. Some 500,000 acres still remain in the ownership of the state.

The Dalles land office announces the opening of townships 11 south, ranges 12 and 13 east, and 9 south, range 13 east on June 1, 1910, except portions along the Deschutes and Matolius rivers, which have been withdrawn from entry for power sites.

According to reports brought in by O. R. & N. traveling agents, Eastern Oregon promises to produce its record wheat crop this year, thanks to ideal weather conditions thus far. The prosperous prediction is even more true for the Deschutes Valley.

Thirty or more homemakers have been located on the Sagebrush Plains wheat lands southeast of Bend during the last month. The summer rush is just commencing, say the locators, and it is expected before the season is over every available acre of this last great stretch of rich Government land will be taken up.

From the Hampton Butte 320-acre homestead country, southeast of Bend, comes the report of extensive building. Land is being cleared, wells dug and fences erected, with the prospect of grain fields soon making their appearance where for long the range cattle and "fuzz tails" alone have held sway. In connection with this homesteading movement it is interesting to note that orders for some six cars of barbed wire have been placed by Bend and Prineville merchants.

May Try Williamson, Too.

Francis J. Heney arrived in Washington last week to confer with Attorney General Wickersham on the disposition of the remaining land fraud cases. The new trial of Binger Hermann and others is to be expedited, if the conference is favorable. Heney is ready now to try Hermann again, and he may couple up Hermann with others in the next trial. Ex-Congressman J. N. Williamson is to be tried again, and while the testimony in the Washington case was not used in the recent Hermann trial, it is among things possible that Heney may try Hermann and Williamson jointly.—Portland Telegram.

Heavy Immigration.

Three hundred families this summer will move upon the segregation of the Deschutes Irrigation & Power Co., of Bend. This number includes only those who took up land under the first two contracts, whose final proof the State Land Board requires to be made before November. And doubtless many more families will take up their residence on the irrigated lands during the next few months, judging from the rapidity with which the throngs of new comers are snapping up the many excellent "buys." All of which means increased crop production, enlarged markets for local merchants, and the general prosperity that goes hand in hand with a new country's development.

AUTO ECHOES.

Mavor C. W. Merrill has purchased a new Ford toy-tonneau, 20 horse-power car.

A. M. Drake, Frank Robertson and M. C. Reed reached Bend Friday evening, having made the trip from The Dalles in Mr. Robertson's new Pope-Hartford touring car.

Four big autos, loaded to the gunwales, passed through Bend last Sunday headed for Christmas Lake. Each passenger sported a badge announcing the fact that they were "Christmas Lake Pioneers."

A splendid run was made in from Shaniko to Bend last week by one of the Radcliffe Brothers' Velle cars, driven by T. R. Dalton. Leaving Shaniko at 7 a. m. the car drew up before the Pilot Butte Inn at 1:10. in good time for dinner. Six hours is a good record for this season.
