CRESCENT ACTIVE

HILL VISITS NEW TOWN

Oregon Trunk Engineers Say Crews There Soon. Road Work and Building Progresses.

CRESCENT, May 23.—Louis W. Hill, paid Crescent a visit last week, arriving Monday evening about 5 o'clock and remaining here until nearly noon the next day. Although his visit was unexpected, the citizens turned out and gave him a rousing welcome. Mr. Hill looked over the surrounding country and expressed himself well pleased. He took a number of pictures for use in advertising the locality. The party went to Klamath Falls, stopping at the camp of Engineer Kyle, five miles above this point.

Chief Engineer R. Budd and assistant, J. J. Cryderman, who has headquarters at Bend, were here. It was announced that the construction crews will reach Crescent about July 1, a delay of a month having been determined upon by the contractors, so that the may take advantage of the new hay crop.

Assistant Chief Engineer Hoy of the Southern Pacific railroad and a party of men who reached here a few days ago, are engaged in completing the automobile road from Crescent to Lakes Crescent and Odell. Mr. Hoy is arranging to establish engineering camps.

Harry Rogers, of the firm of Moffitt & Rogers of Seattle, has contracted for a considerable amount of timber in the forest reserve and also has purchased stumpage from private owners preliminary to putting in a sawmill here.

E. G. Rourk, Edward Santry and William Baldwin are putting up business buildings on the main street of the town.

An office is being erected for the Central Oregon Improvement company which is handling the townsite.

A telephone office will be built shortly.
