LODGE IS FORMED

I. O. O. F. ORGANIZE LOCALLY

Auspicious Beginning of Bend Odd Fellow's Lodge Marked with Enthusiasm. Officers Elected and Many Initiates Taken In.

On Monday afternoon and evening local members of the I O O F. held meetings in which they organized a lodge and initiated many new members to the organization.

The first meeting was in Triplett's Hall at 4:30. With James A. Eastes acting as Special Deputy Grand Master of the occasion the following officers were elected: L. L. Fox, N. G.; E. T. Butts, V. G.; E. R. Parker, Sec.; M. J. Kelley, Treas.; C. P. Niswonger, Warden, and M. C. Knotts, I. G., were appointed.

CROOKED RIVER HAS DROUTH Trouble Over Water Shortage Gets Into Court.

Last week D. P. Stewart and J. W. Carlson, the Prineville flour mill men, began a suit against two dozen settlers and water users on Crooked River above Prineville to prevent them from using for irrigation water claimed by the plaintiffs for power. A temporary injunction was granted by Judge Ellis, of the County Court, until the matter can be heard in Circuit Court. So the settlers were prevented from using water enough to run their crops; and yet the mill men did not get water enough to run their mill.

Below Prineville the dearth of water

in the river is also manifested by shortage of crops. The Crooked River hay crop will be much less than half the usual quantity this year. The Carmichael ditch, 14 miles long, watering a score of big hay ranches, which is usually brimful at this time of the year, does not carry a drop of water now.

This week the flour mill men, having become convinced that use of water by settlers did not cause shortage at the mill, withdrew their injunction suit and the up-river settlers have resumed irrigating. Proceedings for adjudication of the water rights on the stream are now in progress.
