**BEATS NEW ENGLAND**

Vermont Man is Well Pleased Rancher Near Bend.

Willis Benson, who lives about 4 miles out on the Prineville road, brought in some fine samples of irrigated products. Among the exhibits were oats grown on raw land, finely filled out and standing about 5 feet high. Clover standing 24 inches high, medium red variety, cut exactly three months after sowing, was one of the products of Mt. Benson's ranch which bespoke the fertility of the soil. The entire 40 acres was "solid sagebrush" in March 1909, says Mr. Benson. Now there are plum trees which have grown over 3 feet this spring. All his apple trees, 40 in number, are doing splendidly, only two having been lost.

"I have never seen a country where things grow so fast as they do in this," said Mr. Benson. "I have farmed in Vermont for 40 years, raising a lot of clover and other grasses in my time, but I've never seen nearly as good results with all kinds of oats, wheat and clover, as those I've seen here."

**Central Oregon Canal Breaks.**

A break occurred in the D. I. & P. Co.'s Central Oregon canal last Saturday at mile ten. It is expected that the break will be repaired by tomorrow night, twelve teams and a force of men being on the work.

**Lucas Brick Building Progresses.**
