CAMP ON RIVER

RECREATION ON MATOLES

Ice Cold Springs Give Rise to Splendid River North of Sisters—Height of Black Butt Ascertained by National Forest Rangers.

The family of J. M. Lawrence, with Frank May and Floyd Dement spent the latter part of last week on a camping trip to the head of the Metoles river, returning Sunday evening. They found a bad ford at Camp Polk, where it is said no auto has crossed without help this season, and quite sandy going on the upper or most western road between the Metoles and Sisters. The best route is between the two, and avoiding the road over the northeast arm of Black Butte just before reaching the head of the Metoles. Hunting and fishing are poor at this season of the year. A little farther up in the mountains there is game, bear being particularly plentiful.

The Metoles, like Spring river, boils out of the ground and starts on its rapid course, "calling lightly to the sea." Five miles below its source is the Dan Heising ranch, where another bunch of mammoth springs boil out of the earth, adding 240 second feet to the 550 feet already flowing in the main stream. This water is only three degrees above the freezing point at one dairy house and five degrees above at another.

There is a forest ranger station three miles and a half below the rise of the Metoles. Its altitude is only 3000 feet above the sea. Last week the rangers officially ascertained the height of Black Butte to be 6866 feet above sea level.

J. N. Hunter and family left yesterday for an outing on the Metoles.

Last week the party composed of Ex-Senator and Mrs. Whitney L. Boise and Mr. and Mrs. Charles Rnyon visited the Heising place. Supreme Court Justice McBride is in a hunting party at Marion lake, 15 miles farther in the mountains.

IS NOT ENTHUSIASTIC.

Kirk Whited of Redmond drove up to Bend last Saturday. He reports affairs moving forward at a very satisfactory gait in the "Hub City" and all the crops in the adjacent country looking very well. When questioned concerning his views on proposed "Deschutes County" Mr. Whited expressed himself most freely as being strongly opposed to it. He considers the movement decidedly ill-timed and believes that the boundaries as set forth in the initiative petition would work a decided injustice both to the parent county and to much of the territory included within the proposed new county lines.
