TIME FOR SETTLERS TO MOVE.

The irrigation settlers are moving along the right line in organizing for the promotion of their interests. They should have a strong and alert association. This is said without any idea or suggestion that the settlers should be hostile to the reclamation company. It is only business common sense that so large an interest in such a field and such an enterprise should have special representation for both aid and protection.

It is not inconceivable that an organization of this kind might agitate and harrow and hector until it should be a positive injury to every development agency in the field. In factious or obstructive control it might do this. But the present movement is certainly one in good faith by the actual settlers and there is every reason to believe it will result in much good. There is a serious and proper purpose behind it. It is to obtain justice and security for themselves, not to annoy or impose unnecessary difficulties upon the company.

Such a movement, conducted in a spirit of broad-minded fairness, will succeed. It will vastly benefit the entire body of settlers and aid substantially in development of the country. The State Board should have looked after many of the things which the settlers now find to have been left at loose ends, but it didn't and doesn't. Therefore the holders of these lands should lose no time in organizing for the representation which their case demands.

From the amended articles of the Oregon Trunk Railway, recently filed at Olympia, it is observed that the Medford line, 70 miles long, will branch off from the main line at a point several miles south of Klamath Agency. The east-and-west road will join the main line in Section 9, 18-12, on the long tangent a couple of miles south of Bend. It seems probable that construction south and east from Bend will await completion of the road to this point. Supply depots and headquarters stores will be maintained at Shaniko until trains run to Bend next spring, then will be moved here. Thus Bend will be the terminus and construction headquarters for a considerable time.

Roosevelt's United States Marshal for Oregon, Charles J. Reed, with a flawless record, was not good enough for Senator Bourne. Having been freed from the marshalship, Reed is now a candidate for Representative in Congress, in opposition to W. R. King, the present incumbent, with a record as near blank as they make one, and A. W. Lafferty, a former special agent of the General Land Office. With such opposition, Reed, who is really a man of parts, thoroughly Oregonian in his sympathies and affiliations and a born insurgent against the old rings in politics, ought to win.

We are at loss to understand the complaints that night police work is very hard and disagreeable in Bend because it is composed chiefly of "wrestling with drunks." For the dispensing of intoxicating liquors is unlawful and surely we are a law-abiding people. How does it happen that there are so many "drunks" to be "wrestled" with? Or is this a mere figure of speech, or hyperbolic pleasantry?
