Town Booming Helps

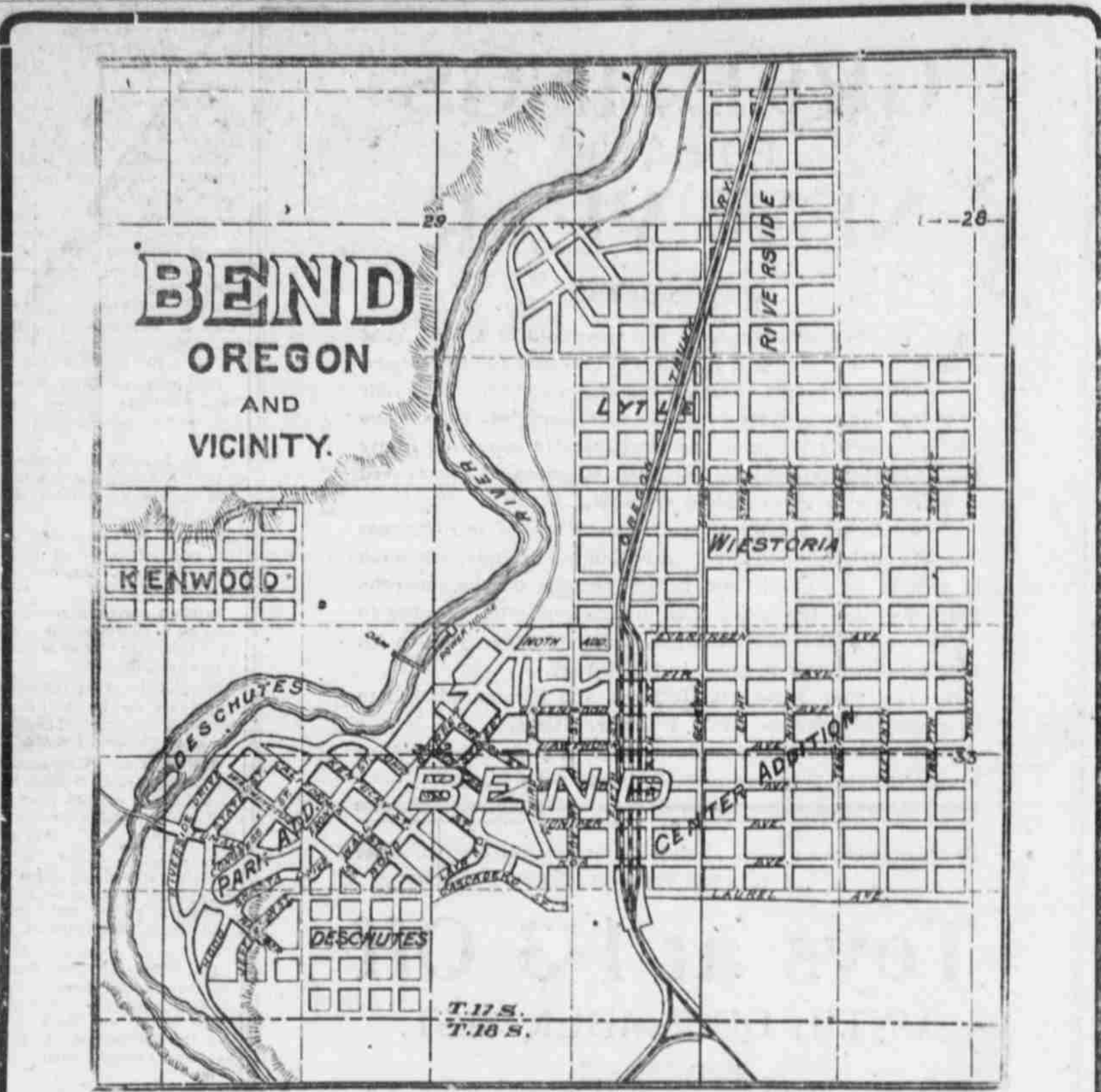
I.—Cackle! Cackle! Cackle!
