NEW COUNCIL IN

CALDWELL ELECTED TO REPLACE OVERTURF.

Mayor Coe, H. E. Allen and Theodore Aune take seats—New Committee Appointed to Draft Amendments to Liquor Ordinance.

At an adjourned meeting of the Common Council held last evening, the old Council met for the last time, and after transacting routine business adjourned. Recorder Ellis then swore in Mayor Coe, who took the chair. Theodore Aune, and H. E. Allen took the oath of office as Aldermen replacing J. W. Hunter and T. Triplett, M. J. Kelly succeeded himself.

At the meeting of the old Council all of the Aldermen were present. The following bills were approved:

Officer Chapman reported five arrests since his last report was made, with a total of \$87.50 assessed in fines. Recorder Ellis' report for the quarter ending December 31 showed 16 meetings of the Council, 27 trials held by him, and 22 convictions with a total of \$234.80 in fines. During the quarter he issued warrants for \$1784.75. The report of Treasurer Spencer showed \$423.67 received during December, and \$391.87 disbursed. When he received the books in January, 1910, there was \$33.19 on hand; during the year he received \$3539.93, and disbursed \$3119.78, leaving a balance of \$453.34 on hand January 1, 1911.

Upon the motion of Kelly, seconded by Oneil, Alderman Overturf's seat was declared vacant, as he is no longer eligible to hold office, living outside of the city limits. Having finished their work the old Council adjourned.

The first business taken up by the new Council was the appointment of a new Alderman to fill the vacant seat. Aune, Kelly and Oneil voted for S. C. Caldwell, and Allen and Sellers for J. M. Lawrence. Caldwell took the oath of office, after a recess, during which Mayor Coe selected his committees, which follow:

- Police, Fire and Liquor License—Allen, Sellers and Kelly.
- Streets, Public Ways and Sewers

—Sellers, Aune and Oneil, Ways and Means—Kelly, Caldwell and Aune.

Health—Allen, Kelly and Sellers. Cemetery and Public Property—Oneil, Caldwell and Aune.

Rules, Order of Business and Elections—Aune, Allen and Kelly.

The petitions of Holmes & Smith, Hugh O'Kane, Silvertooth & Browder, J. R. Williams, C. C. and Dave Williams, Mike Dragich, and of Myers & Wilkey for saloon licenses were referred to the Committee on Police, Fire and Liquor Licenses, to be reported on at the next meeting. A motion to notify applicants for licenses that unless they comply with the liquor ordinance before February 1, their license fee will be refunded, and a license refused, a second application not to be considered, resulted in a tie vote, Sellers, Oneil and Caldwell favoring it, and Aune, Kelly and Allen opposing it. Mayor Coe voted against it. A motion to appoint a special committee to amend the new liquor ordinance resulted in another tie, Allen, Kelly and Aune voting for, Sellers, Oneil and Caldwell against. Mayor Coe voted for the motion, and appointed Allen, Kelly and Aune on the committee.

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RAPID CONSTRUCTION

Steel Has Been Laid on Oregon Trunk Line to 68 Mile Post.

Dr. U. C. Coe, who returned from Portland Sunday evening, is very optimistic about the progress of the railroad work up the Deschutes Canyon, on the Oregon Trunk Line. Just before leaving Portland Dr. Coe had a long talk with E. P. Shannon, Secretary and Treasurer of the Oregon Trunk Line, and other Hill interests, and President Stevens' assistant.

"Mr. Shannon informed me," said Dr. Coe, "that the steel had been laid to the 68 mile post and it is his belief that trains will be running to Metolus by February 20. Mr. Shannon receives a telegraphic report of the day's progress every evening; the track-laying machine put down 11,000 feet, or a little over two miles of steel one day, but the average is from 8,000 to 11,000 feet, when there are no delays.

"There is a tunnel at the 71 mile post which might tie up the work for a few days. The next delay will probably be at the crossing of the Deschutes River, a few miles north west of Madras, where a steel bridge has to be put in. With this exception, and the Crooked River bridge, the road-bed will be ready for the track-laying machine, through to Bend.

"Five or six of the concrete piers for the Oregon Trunk bridge over the Columbia appeared to me to be completed. These piers are on the west side of the Columbia. There is a large force of men at work, and the company appears to be desirous of building this bridge as rapidly as possible."

COURT CONVENES

ENLARGEMENT OF DISTRICT 12 CONTINUED TO MARCH.

Tax Levy for 1911 fixed at 16 Mills—Logging Application Again Continued—New Road Districts are Established.

The January term of the County Commissioners' Court met at the court house at Prineville January 4, and remained in session for nearly a week. There was more business transacted at this meeting than at any previous session. Commissioner Rice is in Portland attending the Wool Grower's Convention, and Judge Ellis and Commissioner Bailey were the only members present.

The application of John E. Ryan, or the Deschutes Logging Co., was continued over to the March term of court in order to secure briefs on the question of the right of the County Court to grant a franchise for logging on the Deschutes River, and the opinion of the District Attorney on the subject. This proposition came up at the November term, and was carried over to the January term.

The question of enlarging the boundaries of School District 12 was argued before the Boundary Board by T. E. J. Duffy for the petitioners, and M. R. Elliott for the objectors. In the absence of a full Board, and in order to secure an opinion from the State Superintendent of Schools, the matter was continued to the March term. The Boundary Board is composed of the County School Superintendent and the members of the County Court. John E. Ryan, one of the objectors to the granting of the petition, made a long talk before the Board. Clerk Weist and F. M. Ray, members of the School Board of District 12 were also present as representatives of the District.

The tax levy on the 1910 roll for the year 1911 was fixed at 16 mills, divided as follows: General County and State, 7 1/2 mills. General School, 3 1/2 mills. Road (exclusive of Prineville), 3 19-20 mills. High School (exclusive of District 12), 1 1/2 mills. Library, 1-20 mills. Total, 16 mills.

This levy is five-tenths of a mill higher than the levy last year. The principal reason for the increase is to secure more money for the road fund.

Three new road districts were created in the northwestern part of the County, Hillman, Cline Falls and Sisters being the names by which they will be known. Practically all of the present road supervisors were reappointed.

The Court approved the bonds of the incoming County officials. T. N. Balfour, tax collector, gave a personal bond, thereby saving the County the expense of obtaining a surety company's bond for him. The jury list, consisting of the names of 200 tax payers, was drawn.

Several plats were approved by the Court. A plat of the new town of Roberts, at the G. E. Robert-ranch about 25 miles north east of Bend, on the Prineville-Bear Creek road, was accepted. Several plats of additions to Redmond, and the one of the new town of Vanora, about 12 miles north west of Madras, on the Deschutes River, were approved.

BEND DEFEATED

PRINEVILLE FOOTBALL TEAM WINS 17-0 GAME.

Out-Played in All Points of the Game—Contest Proves Interesting, Although Local Team Had No Chance to Win the Game.

The Bend football team was defeated by the Prineville aggregation Saturday on the latter's grounds by 17-0 score. The game was much closer than the score would indicate, although the Bend boys at no time during the game had any chance to get the lead in the score.

The game was characterized throughout with fast playing, and there were but few discussions over decisions to detract from the game. Dr. W. W. Faulkner officiated as umpire and George Alexander of Redmond as referee. The game was played under the new rules.

The Prineville team showed the results of its consistent training. The boys worked out every afternoon for the past ten days, and were able to run off their plays much faster than the Bend team could. There were no serious injuries during the game, although Ray Wilkinson returned Sunday looking as though he had been through a hard contest.

The Prineville team was strengthened by the addition of several new players. Gumm of Redmond, proved to be a tower of strength. Brewster, who played a star game here, was also in every play, and although he was hurt a few times, he managed to stay throughout the game. Coe also played a very good game. A. M. Pringle started to play one down, but the strained ligament in his leg gave way. Wilkinson, Metke and Weider played an exceptionally strong game on the defense. There was no noticeably weak points in the Bend line-up.

Prineville scored within the first four minutes of play, but failed to kick the goal. During the second quarter Richardson tumbled when receiving the ball back of his own goal for a punt, and Brewster of Prineville got it, making a second touchdown, which was converted, making the score 11-0. The third touchdown and goal were made in the last quarter.

The Prineville team gave a dance in the evening in the P. A. A. C. Hall, at which all of the Bend people were present as guests. After the dance a supper was served to the visiting team and friends.

PINE FOREST CO. ELECT

Officers and Directors for Ensuing Year Chosen.

At the annual meeting of the stockholders of the Pine Forest Irrigation Co held Saturday afternoon at the McGillivray school house the following Directors were elected for the ensuing year:

It was decided to go ahead with the construction work as rapidly as the weather will permit, as it is the intention to have water on the land by the next irrigating season. An assessment of \$2.00 per acre was levied by the stockholders. This Company, which is subsid-

ary to the Arnold Irrigation Company, will carry the water from the end of the Arnold canal, near the Silver Lake road. The North lateral will also receive its water from the Arnold canal. The Pine Forest Irrigation Company now has contracts to supply water to 5000 acres of land, and will contract in the near future to supply 1000 acres more.

At a meeting of the Board of Directors held at C. D. Rowe's store on Monday the following officers were elected for the ensuing year:

The Directors ordered from the Bend Lumber Co., the lumber for the 500 foot flume to be built north of the Silver Lake road. The lumber is being delivered now, and the construction work will begin in the near future.

WATER USERS ELECT

Redmond Delegation Present and Will Organize With Association.

The regular annual meeting of the Water User's Association was held Saturday afternoon at the hall over the postoffice, and the following officers were elected for the ensuing year:

Secretary—S. H. Snyder, Treasurer—C. W. Hoech. Directors—E. A. Griffin, L. C. Young, E. W. Richardson, G. W. Ferris and J. A. Thompson, representing the water users about Redmond, were present, and stated that it was the desire of the men they represented to organize with the local Association. Next Saturday afternoon a meeting will be held at Redmond, at which time those interested in the movement will be present and join the association. The officers will go down for the meeting, taking all the organizations books.

The name of the organization was changed to The Central Oregon Irrigation Company Water User's Association. The articles of incorporation were submitted, and the Association is now incorporated under the state laws.

INNES LOSES CASE

Contest Case Over Morrill Homestead Is Lost by Plaintiff.

V. A. Forbes, attorney for the defendant, received a letter Sunday from the Commissioner of the General Land Office at Washington, stating that the decision in the case of Joe Innes vs. H. W. Morrill, defended by his heir Arthur Morrill of Powell Butte, had been reversed. This was a contest case over the Morrill homestead west of the river. The local land office at The Dalles gave a decision in April, 1910, for the plaintiff, who was represented by C. S. Benson.

SCHOOL AFFAIRS

CONSTRUCTION OF FIRE ESCAPES AUTHORIZED.

Young School Will Not be Opened Unless Petitioners Furnish Equipped Building—New Flag and Set of Reference Books Ordered.

At the meeting of the School Board held at Chairman Triplett's store Saturday evening the following bills were approved:

The bid, by Sutherland & McIntosh, to build the two exits for \$157.75 was accepted, provided they would agree to certain minor changes in the plans. The one from the second floor will be built on the east side of the building, the double doors opening into a cloak room. The first floor exit is to be on the north side of the school house.

Clerk Weist was instructed to order a new 8 foot flag for the school, as well as a 22 volume set of the International Encyclopedia in a cloth binding, at \$30.00.

In regard to equipping the Young school, it was decided that unless those applying for the new school would furnish a suitable building, with stove and wood, as previously agreed to, the proposition would be dropped.

Principal Harrington was present and reported that during the three school weeks in December seven high school pupils were absent 20 of the 25 days on which absences were recorded and were credited with 35 of the 44 cases of tardiness. The Board requested him to draw up a set of school rules to be submitted at the next meeting. The Board favored taking action in regard to the cases, and will in all probability do so at its next meeting.

To Remodel Hotel Bend.

Hugh O'Kane will begin work in the near future on several improvements to be made at the Hotel Bend. A cigar stand will be put in the front of the room now occupied by his bar on Oregon street. The dining room is to be enlarged, and an entrance from Bond street to the room will be put in. He will also remodel the general arrangements of the hotel.

Electricity at Redmond.

The plant of the Crook County Water, Light & Power Co., at Redmond has been installed, and the buildings are now being wired for lights. Instead of using arcs for street lighting, a cluster of five incandescent bulbs under a large reflector is used. Five such lights have been put up on Sixth Street.
