WORK COMPLETED

Roberts Bros. Deliver Lumber To O. T. Ry. And Have Much on Hand.

Roberts Brothers Lumber Co. have finished delivering lumber on their contract with the Oregon Trunk Railway, bringing in all, some 850,000 feet to points along the grade between Madras and Bend. Their Slaters mill, supplied all the timbers, etc. used in bridge and culvert building in this 50-mile stretch of the work.

Tom Roberts, who was here Monday, says that they have over a million feet of dry lumber in their yard, as well as a million feet of logs ready for sawing. It is their intention to dispose of the dry lumber in Bend, probably establishing a yard here, or handling it through an agency. Their mill is 22.3 miles from Bend.

A planer has been shipped to Madras, and Mr. Roberts says it is expected to be in operation by the middle of March.

VETERAN TELLS EXPERIENCES.

On Sunday evening at the Baptist Church, J. I. West delivered a very interesting talk upon his war time experiences. His reminiscences dealt particularly with the battle of Chickamauga, in September, '63, at which he was captured, and his subsequent trip to Libby Prison, where he was confined until the completion of Andersonville, to which he was removed later.
