

BEND IS BEATEN

PRINEVILLE BASKET SHOOTERS WIN.

Second Game, However, Technically Goes to Local Team, Visitors Quitting When Center is Put Off For Rough Playing.

The basket ball team of the Prineville Commercial Club Athletic Association defeated the Bend team Friday evening by the overwhelming score of 42 to 17. The second game, played Saturday night, officially was a victory for Bend, for the Prineville players left the floor after Referee Overturf had put their center, Ellis, out of the game for repeated rough playing and disregard of the rules. The score, when the game stopped, was 43 to 10 in favor of Prineville.

In Friday's game, Wheelock, Springer, Steidl, Richardson and Putnam played for Bend; Ellis, Brewster, Gamelgard, McAlister and McAlister for Prineville. The line-up and score of Saturday's game, up to within 2 1/4 minutes of final time, when Prineville quit, was as follows:

In the first half 6 fouls were called on Bend and 9 on Prineville. In the second 4 on Bend and seven on the visitors. In both games Ellis showed either an entire lack of knowledge of the rules or no desire to obey them, players and spectators alike demanding his removal from the game for his repeated fouling, which removal was delayed only because the visitors had brought no substitutes to take his place.

TELLS TALL TALE

NO ROGUES IN GOOD, OLD SHANIKO.

Doyle Describes Duties as Oregon Crime Eradicator.—Terminal Town Gets Big Census Boost in Eastern Interview.

Ex-Policeman Doyle of Shaniko has a lot to say concerning Shaniko in an interview recently published in the St. Louis Star. Evidently the Missourians entertained the Oregon visitor pretty well, or the distance from his home town has magnified it beyond recognition. Herewith the clipping in question, which, if accurate, is an educational as it is interesting.

Chief of Police J. B. Doyle of Shaniko, Ore., was a visitor in

Police Headquarters yesterday, and last night was shown about the city by one of Chief of Detectives Smith's men.

"This is a big city, and, no doubt, a great one," said Chief Doyle, "but, as for me, take me back to Shaniko. There we do business different. We do not have a big rogue's gallery, because we do not have rogues out there. As soon as a stranger arrives in town we look him over and trail him to his stopping place. Then we watch to see if he goes to bed. If he does he is all right, but if he does not, he must explain why he is opposed to sleep. If he cannot give a satisfactory answer he gets a few hours to leave town. We only have nine policemen, but they are on the job when they are needed. It is watchfulness that counts and that is the principal part of the business of the police in our city. We have between 15,000 and 20,000 inhabitants and there is little crime." Chief Doyle has been in Louisville visiting his parents. He said he liked his old home town, but preferred to live in Oregon, which, he said, offered more opportunities for the young man than any other state in the Union.

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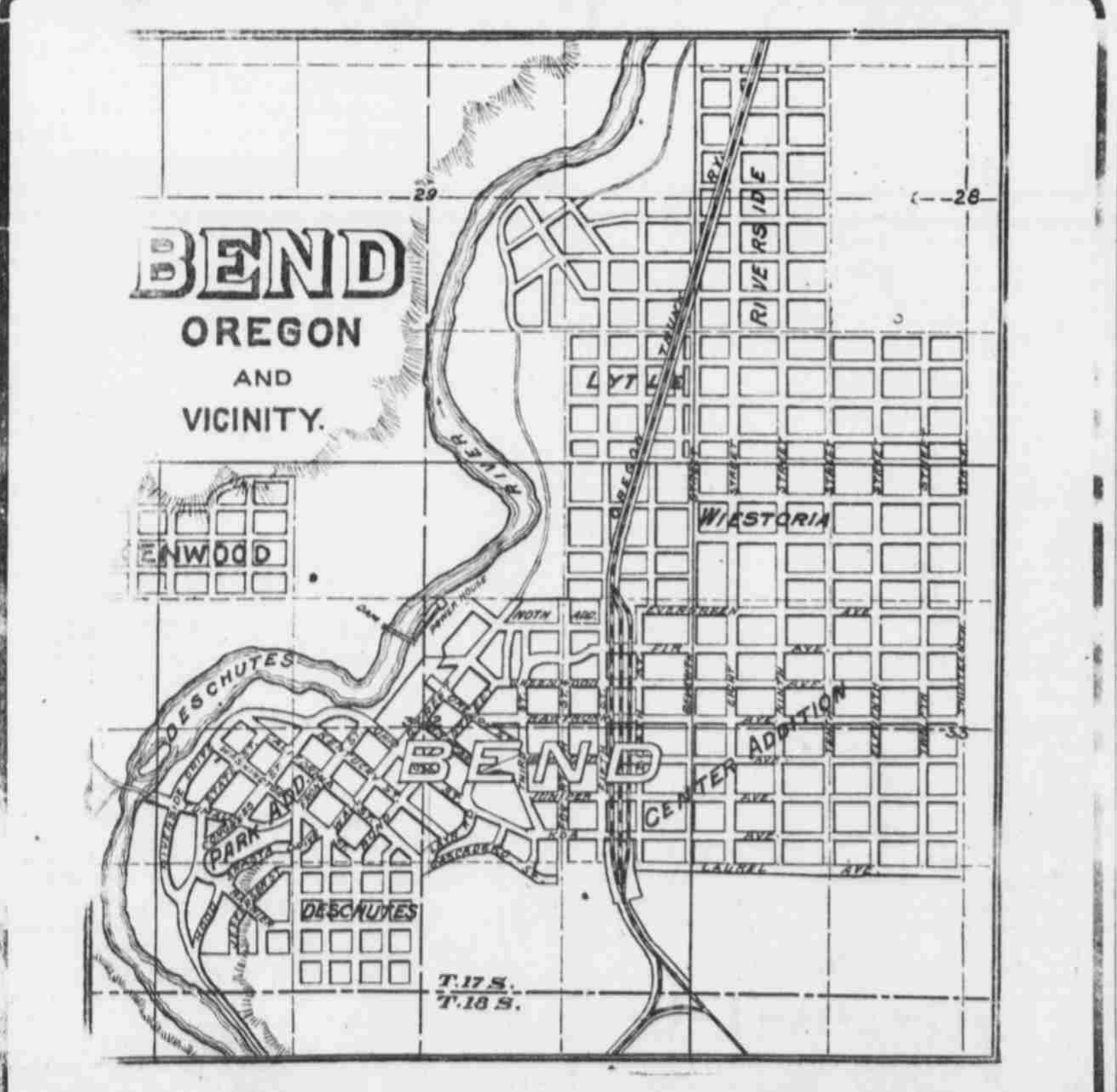
