START ROADWORK

BEND-BURNS ROUTE BEING SURVEYED

Party Started Monday to Locate Best Road Route From Bend Through Homestead Country to Harney County.

On Monday the locating party for the Bend-Burns road left Bend for the southeast, to be absent probably about two weeks. Road Supervisor E. W. Richardson heads the party, Frank May is the engineer and Ray Wilkinson compass man. The other members are Alineus Neff and Phil Denner.

The party will locate the best and most feasible route from Bend to the Harney County line, near the southeast corner of Crook, there joining the present excellent road from Burns. Flags, with "Bend-Burns Road" printed on them, will be put on stakes along the road route as located.

As soon as the route has been laid out construction will be commenced. In the entire distance the work of road making is extremely light, for the most part consisting simply of clearing the sagebrush. No hills or a dobe are encountered. It is the intention of the committee having in charge the road making that the new route shall be ready for all kinds of travel considerably before the railroad reaches Bend. Even as it is, without any improvement it is understood the route is practicable for freighting.

VANDEVERT ARRIVES.

Bend Man Travels Far in Search of Sleeping Accomodations.

W. P. Vandever returned Saturday, having been absent about a month, visiting Portland and Salem.

On his return trip he reports finding extremely crowded conditions at Madras and Redmond; so many people and so few beds, in fact, that he, with ten others, was compelled to come through to Bend to find a sleeping place, arriving here at 3 A. M.

Mr. Vandever visited his family at Salem. His son Clint, who is attending college there, is recovering from an attack of pneumonia.

"Bend should begin preparing for the big rush at once," said Mr. Vandever. "Madras is swamped, and before long we'll have to have a tent city here."

WILL BUILD ADDITION.

Wenandy Livery Co. to Increase Stable Room.

J. H. Wenandy has started work on an addition to his livery barn on Bond Street near Greenwood. The new building will be 32x80 feet and will be in the rear of the present building.

George Brosterhouse is in charge of the work, which will require about two weeks to complete. The addition will give the company a building 100x140 feet.

On Sunday evening Marie Sandborg, wife of Dr. F. S. Sandborg, died at the Sandborg apartment in the May building. The death was very sudden, resulting from heart disease, to attacks of which the deceased had been subject for many years. The deceased is survived by her husband and two children, Harold and Ralph.

At the time of her death Mrs. Sandborg was 40 years old. While Dr. Sandborg came to Bend about six weeks ago his family had been with him here but nine days. Mrs. Sandborg was a prominent member of the Baptist church, a member of the Ladies' Library Club and always a diligent worker in the various social activities with which she identified herself.

The funeral took place Tuesday. Dr. W. L. Wilson conducted services at the Baptist church. There was special music by the quartet and Mrs. Lindborg sang a solo, "Face to Face."

MAN TO MADRAS

WILL TELL NEWCOMERS ABOUT BEND

Subscription Raised To Keep Bend Booster At End of Rails To Help Immigration in This Direction—Vandever Goes on Work

A meeting was held at the Commercial Club rooms Monday evening to discuss the advisability of sending a representative from Bend and vicinity to the end of the railroad to enable new comers to receive definite instructions as to how to reach here.

V. A. Forbes acted as chairman. A. C. Lucas reported that about \$160 had been subscribed today for the Bend booster.

After several talks it was decided that such a move was very necessary, and if sufficient funds could be raised, a representative to "boost for Bend," will be kept at the end of the railroad until it reaches Bend.

J. S. Stewart, A. C. Lucas, C. L. Hotaling and W. P. Vandever were nominated to fill the position. Messrs. Stewart and Lucas declined, and the ballot resulted in W. P. Vandever being chosen. The best methods to pursue in accomplishing the purpose were left to the discretion of Mr. Vandever who left for Madras yesterday afternoon.

At last Thursday's meeting A. M. Lara was elected director to take the place vacated by the resignation of G. P. Putnam.

EXTENSION OF TIME.

Settlers On Irrigated Land May Delay Until October.

The following letter to the Central Oregon Irrigation Co., from the Secretary of the Desert Land Board, contains an announcement of great interest to settlers:

SALEM, Ore., March 3, 1911.—Gentlemen: Some time ago the Board granted an extension of time to all contract holders whose land is ready for proof and who have not yet made proof, requiring them to complete their proof on or before July 1, 1911. The Board has been requested to extend this time to October 1, 1911 to enable such settlers to enter the segregation on the railroad and the Board accordingly, on the 1st inst., granted such an extension of time up to October 1, 1911 and notices to that effect have been sent to the several contract holders.
