RAILROAD BUSY

PASSENGERS COME IN,
FREIGHT GOES OUT.

In its first week of operation the Oregon Trunk Railway brought 452 passengers to Madras. The number for the second week, which ends today probably, will be about 400.

About 30 cars of freight arrived at Madras and Metolius. Thus far only car load lots are being taken on to Metolius, and then handled, until the erection of a warehouse, by the railroad company itself. Considerable difficulty has been encountered in caring for freight at Madras due to the fact that the warehouse there has been full of wheat. It is understood that during the present week representatives of Balfour, Guthrie & Co. have arranged to take this wheat, thus relieving the congestion.

On March 7th work was commenced on the Madras depot. The building is to be 30x115 feet.

Among the shipments from Madras have been 14 cars of cattle, and 4000 sheep for the Portland markets and a car of Hereford Bulls, consigned to Honolulu, from the ranch of G. H. Gray near Prineville.

Last week W. C. Wilkes, Asst. Gen'l. Freight Agent of the S. P. & S. R. R., conferred with the sheep men in Prineville in regard to the shipment of this year's wool crop. According to Mr. Wilkes practically all the Crook County clip this year will be handled either at Madras or Metolius, at one of which points facilities for handling the big wool business will be arranged by the railroad.

It is expected that next year's shipment will be made from Madras-Metolius and Bend, the former point commanding the shipments from the northern portion of the county and Bend becoming shipping point for the southern territory and the great southeastern ranges in Harney and Lake Counties. Undoubtedly wool sales such as have been conducted at Shaniko each year will be held here after the advent of the railroad.

BUILDING RESIDENCES.

Deschutes Addition Sees Erection of Many New Homes.

"Something doing" in the building line is the verdict accorded Deschutes by those who are familiar with development thereabout. Ten residences have sprung up there during the past few months, not to mention many tents.

BIG TONNAGE PROMISED

Burns Freighting from Bend Will Be Enormous.

The following letter received by The Bulletin from a well informed Burns man gives an interesting idea of the benefits which Bend may expect to reap from the Bend-Burns road.

Taking up your letter of the 22nd ultimo relative to the approximate amount of freighting that might be expected to come from the West into Burns and Harney County, provided good roads are made from the railroad points to connect with Burns roads, will say that I have given the matter some little study and have taken the pains to take the matter up with several of our business men. In round numbers the freight hauled into Burns each year is from 3,500,000 pounds to 4,000,000. Merchants outside of Burns use about the same amount, and you can add a like amount for the big cattle ranches and miscellaneous, making a total of from 10,000,000 to 15,000,000 pounds. But a small part of this will come in from the east in my opinion. Burns merchants will get their freight in as low as possible, and the point that furnishes the best facilities is the point that will get the business.

The export business while it will be quite a volume, is harder for me to approximate. This would consist of wool and livestock principally. The passenger traffic from Harney County will be worthy of consideration in this regard.

The Burns Commercial Club expects to have a delegation at Bend on the day you drive the "golden spike."

MORE CASH FOR ROAD

Bend-Burns Route Preliminary Work Nearly Finished.

Homesteaders in the Millican country bring in word that the "Bend-Burns" flags already are strung along the route of the new road from Bend well to the east of Millican. The road is practically straight.

During the last week \$135 more has been contributed to the road building fund, bringing it to a total of \$765. The recent contributors are: Bend Townsite Co. \$100, Silvertooth & Browder \$20, J. F. Taggart & Co \$5, U. C. Coe \$5, J. H. O'Neil \$5.

Chas. N. Clark, who, with J. H. Stewart has a section of land in 20-18, 15 miles east of Millican, says that he plans to erect a road house on his property. The proposed stopping place will be directly on the new Bend-Burns road, says Mr. Clark.

It is understood the road surveying party under E. W. Richardson has practically completed their work to the Harney County line, and is expected to be back in Bend this week.

O'NEIL BUYS SALOON.

Last week O'Neil Brothers of O'Neil, who have interests at Madras and Shaniko, purchased the Biggerstaff saloon on Bond Street. James Serravalle is the manager for the new proprietors, the establishment now being known as the Roma Saloon. In the purchase was included the restaurant and all saloon equipment.

CITY MAY BUILD CLOSE BIG DEAL

COUNCIL PLANS BUILDING CITY HALL.

Will Spend \$10,000 on Improvements, \$2000 of Which Will Be Spent This Year—Officers Re-appointed—More Sidewalks.

At the meeting of the Common Council held last evening the special committee appointed by the Mayor to confer with the Townsite Co. in regard to a lot for a city hall reported that the matter had been taken up with J. M. Lawrence, who suggested that the Council pick out three or more sites and give estimates of the proposed improvements. Thereupon the Council decided to spend \$10,000 on a city hall, at least \$2000 of which would be spent this year. Mr. Lawrence told the committee that the company would meet the Council more than half way in the selling of a site.

S. E. Roberts was re-appointed day officer, and Willard Huston as night officer. Marshal Kelly, J. B. Doyle and Frank Robinson were each in turn appointed night officer by the Mayor, but the Council failed to confirm them.

The report of Marshal Kelly showed \$67.50 in fines, assessed during February. Treasurer Spencer's report showed \$604.08 disbursed during February, and a balance of \$3500.87 on hand March 1.

Upon reconsideration of its former action, the Council voted to issue a liquor license to Zulaney & Campbell, as soon as they complied with the ordinances.

Bills to the amount of \$200.08 were ordered paid.

The following sidewalks, with necessary crossings, were ordered built: north side Greenwood, lots 1 to 6 incl., block 23, and lots 1 to 7, incl., block 24; east side of block 24, lots 7 and 8; south side of Fir, lots 1 to 6, incl., block 23, and lots 1, 2, 3, 4, 10, 9, and 8, block 24.

The Council adjourned to Friday March 24.

REV. C. M. CLINE HERE

District Missionary For Central Oregon to Live Here.

Rev. C. M. Cline, formerly of Tonkawa, Okla., is in Bend and will make his home here. He is District Missionary for Central Oregon in the Baptist Church. Rev. Dr. Cline will conduct services at the Baptist Church on Sunday, March 26, and second Sundays thereafter.

Dr. Black, formerly a pastor at Walla Walla, delivered the morning and evening sermons Sunday. He is now in the Evangelistic field, and will preach in many of the smaller churches throughout the interior. Rev. Wilson will conduct the regular services next Sunday.

TOWNSITE TRANSFER OCCURS NEXT WEEK.

Lumber Mill To Open, Water and Electric Systems to Be Enlarged and Development Undertaken, is New Company's Plan.

J. M. Lawrence left today for Portland where the final acts in the transfer of the Bend holdings of Messrs. Drake and Robertson to the Bend Company will take place. The incorporation and organization of the Bend Company and delivery of the properties will be made there next week if possible. The fact that some of the men interested are in the East may produce a little delay as signatures are required to formal documents, but aside from this possibility the transaction will proceed to speedy completion. In discussing the matter Mr. Lawrence said:

"While many small details remain to be settled—indeed, from the very nature of the case, the new organization and new policy are not yet officially determined, because the new company is not yet incorporated—it may be said that A. O. Hunter will probably be manager of real estate and publicity and Clyde McKay will have charge of the lumbering. Mr. Hunter, who has already achieved much success in the Bend field, is one of the best sales managers in the country. He has the best of connections and he knows the business thoroughly. He has taken the leading part in the financing of this new deal. Clyde McKay has been with the Mueller Lumber Co. all his business life and has been their trusted man in the woods and in milling operations in the upper Mississippi Valley. For some time he has been looking after the Mueller interests on the Deschutes, so he is familiar with conditions here.

"It is likely that there will be a revision downward in the sale prices of lots and that special concessions will be made to those who will improve their property. Water and light service will be extended. The saw mill will be started as soon as possible, perhaps by the first of the month, and operated to its full capacity. The dry kiln will probably be doubled in size immediately. The electric power station will be improved and painted and its capacity doubled. Water will be taken from the river above town as soon as the change can be made. Assistance will be given to the building of good roads.

"There will be generous co-operation with every agency developing Central Oregon. The Company will act upon the idea that it can prosper only when the community prospers and that a considerable responsibility for the common good rests upon it.

MILL ORGANIZED

WORK ON FLOUR MILL IS BEGUN.

Bend Milling & Warehouse Company Incorporates and Starts Work On Bend's First Flour Mill—Will Be Well Equipped.

Preliminary construction operations have commenced on Bend's first flour mill. The mill will be located near the power house on the spur track of the Oregon Trunk.

Last week C. I. Bozell, who is at the head of the organization handling the milling enterprise, commenced clearing preparatory to foundation work.

The Bend Milling and Warehouse Company is the title of the new organization, which has just been incorporated, with a capitalization of \$15,000. It is understood that with Mr. Bozell are associated a number of local investors.

The mill is to have a daily capacity of from 80 to 100 barrels, says Mr. Bozell. The dimensions of the building are 32 by 48 feet, with three stories and a basement. The mechanical equipment will consist of five double stands of rolls, two feed rolls, sifter style of bolting with modern purifier and bran dusters. The wheat cleaning machinery will include a receiving separator and two scouring machines. Power will be furnished by a 50 H. P. three-phase 60-cycle induction motor.

"We expect to draw wheat from all parts of Central Oregon," said Mr. Bozell. "Our intention is to buy the best and make the best grade of flour. Later we expect to install an alfalfa meal mill provided there is enough alfalfa raised to justify it."

In addition to its flour milling interests the new company expects to handle milling and farm machinery.

M. S. Lattin Returns From Two Week's Trip.

M. S. Lattin returned Sunday evening from Seattle and reports that a large delegation of Seattle people will come to Bend on the first train.

"Many of the clerks," said Mr. Lattin, "are postponing their trip until the train arrives so as to be able to spend their vacations in and about Bend. Bend is the only town one hears talked of in Seattle now."

WILL QUARRY ROCK NEAR BEND.

J. I. West and W. P. Golden have purchased a channeller machine which will be shipped to Metolius immediately. Mr. West says they intend to quarry extensively near Red Rock Canyon, about 2 miles north-west of Bend. They expect to be able to furnish all cut rock required in Bend buildings by May first.
