OUR EIGHTH BIRTHDAY.

With this issue The Bulletin starts upon the eighth year of its publication. The paper, indeed, practically is contemporaneous with Bend itself, for the town came into an existence worthy of the name little if any before the founding of the paper, early in the spring of 1903. During these eight years the paper and the town have advanced steadily, in size, importance and prosperity. The development of the past however, material and praiseworthy as it has been, is overshadowed by the promise of advancement which the present year holds both for town and for paper.

A brief word may not be out of place concerning The Bulletin's history. And, as the development of the local paper must go hand in hand with that of the town which it represents, a further few sentences concerning the paper's expectations of enlargement during its tenth year, may be of interest to all having Bend's future at heart.

The first number of The Bulletin was issued with Max Lueddemann of Antelope as owner and Don Rea, of Madras as editor. In August 1903, J. M. Lawrence, then U. S. Commissioner at Bend, bought a half interest in the paper, which he edited until January 1, 1906, for two years after which C. D. Rowe conducted the paper for Mr. Lawrence. In May, 1908, Mr. Lawrence sold his half interest to Mr. Lueddemann. Soon after the paper passed into the possession of Fred S. Stanley of Portland, who in February 1910, sold to Don Steffa. On March 1, 1910, the property was purchased by G. P. Putnam and J. M. Lawrence. Early in December of last year Mr. Putnam acquired Mr. Lawrence's half interest, and now exclusively owns and controls the paper, of which he is the editor.

The Bulletin's interests are Bend's interests. Its purpose is to advance Bend's welfare and that of Central Oregon to the utmost of its ability. Politically, religiously and industrially, The Bulletin is absolutely independent. Its desire is to give a square deal to everyone. That it will make mistakes and incur the displeasure of some, is inevitable; a newspaper so insipidly weak as to be without critics would be a poor thing indeed.

During the last year The Bulletin has increased the size of its issue from four to eight pages, as well as enlarging the size of the pages themselves. In its new shop, the most commodious in Central Oregon, the paper has installed a power engine, much new type, including an entire news "dress," and sufficient advertising and job types to meet all possible present requirements, and a vast deal of other equipment calculated to increase the efficiency of the plant.

A new zincblock press, which will be the largest in operation in the interior, is being installed. Its weight is 8,000 pounds; it will print not only the newspaper but all kinds of large circulars, posters and general high class job work. Its installation means that The Bulletin shop will be prepared to handle any and every class of work.

It is the management's intention to make of The Bulletin a semi-weekly, to be published on Tuesday and Saturday. Until the additional equipment necessary for such a change is installed and in operation, definite announcement of the date of the twice-a-weeks' first appearance cannot be made. Suffice to say that considerably before Bend has its first train it will have a semi-weekly, and one that will be ready to transfer itself into a daily just as soon—or perhaps a little sooner—as the town's growth can justify the belief that such an institution would be self-supporting.

The Bulletin upon its eighth birthday promises its readers and patrons for this new year a bigger and a better weekly, a semi-weekly that will be a credit to the community, and a daily, as soon as feasible. Like Bend, The Bulletin has barely commenced its development.
